Coronation Cup. Halifax, N. S., Aug. 24.—Six slim, rakish-looking craft anchored in Halifax harbor were last night given a final careful "tuning-up" before spreading their wings today for the first of the Coronation Cup races to be held here this week under the auspices of the Royal Nova Scotia Yacht Squadron.

They were: Windward, R. A. Corbett, starting at scratch; Scrapper III, F. W. Baldwin, Brass d'Or Yacht Club, with a handicap of sixteen minutes and nineteen seconds; Althea, W. Potter, Royal Cape Breton Yacht Squadron, 21.48; Scotia Yacht Squadron, 21.48; Elsie (yawl), G. Grosvenor, Brass d'Or Yacht Club, 19.19; Wa Wa (yawl), H. Metcalf, Royal Nova Scotia Yacht Squadron, 24.50.

Casey Baldwin's Scrapper III, which was driven ashore at Liscombe on the way to Halifax, was not much damaged, according to survivors who looked her over on the marine slip, where she was hauled up on her arrival. She will have to race with spiked masts and rigging. The peculiar sloping decks of the Scrapper III have caused considerable comment among local yachtsmen, who look forward with interest to her performance. Starter—Commodore J. H. Barton.

Two Crews Disqualified. At a meeting of the Maritime Provinces Amateur Oarsmen's Association, held in the Union Club, last evening, with R. T. Macbeth presiding, it was decided to disqualify the junior four-oared crew representing St. Mary's A. C. of Halifax, for rowing with a crew of five.

The Assumption four-oared crew in the senior event was disqualified as well for rowing with a crew of five instead of from port to starboard. Notice of motion was given that the annual meeting of the association should be held in future on the evening preceding the day of the championship meet.

Ross Memorial. The Ross memorial race was one of the best of the day. The handsome trophy offered for the event gave it particular importance and all contenders were trying their hardest for the honor of getting the first hold on a handle of the resplendent trophy.

Four starters got away at the crack of the gun, Grenville McCavour, of the St. John A. R. C., Lawrence O'Connell and George Power, of the St. Mary's club, and Harry Giggie, of the Millville club.

Young McCavour shot into the lead and a third of the way down the course he had a length on the three other contenders who were about on even terms. O'Connell and Power pulled up on McCavour.

Having negotiated the turn, the boys started for home rowing much better courses than they did on the trip out. A quarter mile from the finish Giggie had about two lengths on O'Connell and Power while McCavour was two lengths in the rear of the Halifax boys.

During the last quarter Giggie, rowing with the long powerful, bely-like stroke, further widened the gap behind him while at the same time O'Connell pulled away from Power. Giggie crossed the line a winner by 11-2 lengths ahead of O'Connell who came in second with Power third only half a length behind him. McCavour was quite a way behind. The time was 11.47-1-2.

On the Judges' Boat. His Worship Mayor Schofield was host for the afternoon on the judges' boat, the Neptune, which was anchored at the outer flag at the starting line. Those on board had a particularly good opportunity of viewing the events. Among those on the tugboat were the judges, J. A. Gregory and James L. Gowan, of Halifax, the starter, Frank White, and his assistant, Charles Gorman, skating champion; His Worship the Mayor, Commissioners Bullock, Jones and Frisk, Hon. Dr. J. B. M. Baxter, Senator Thorne, W. E. Scully, M. P. P., and party, Mr. and Mrs. C. Allan, Hon. R. J. Ritchie, K. C. Irvine, representing the Montreal A. C. A. W. Covey, president of the M. P. B. A. A. A., Dr. Thomas Walker, who was an official of the race fifty years ago; L. R. Ross, donor of the Ross Memorial trophy; Rev. R. G. Fulton, donor of the Fulton Memorial trophy, George H. Reynolds, an oarsman of the old days who had rowed against members of the Paris Crew and who was in a race on the Kennebecasis in 1858, Alexander Bragley, who also rowed there in 1871, and others. The eight hours on the water on the Neptune were most enjoyable to all on board, particularly as guests of the hospitable mayor, who furnished a very welcome lunch and cigars at his own expense.
