Frederickton Paper Reviews the Matter of the Suspension Bridge

INFORMATION WANTED

Government Knew That Span Was Not What It Ought to Be and for More Than a Year Kept People Ignorant Until Opposition Member Forced Information Out

(Frederickton Mail.)

The suspension bridge over the Reversing Falls at St. John is, perhaps, not of direct local interest to the people of York. At the same time, since the bridge is used daily by hundreds of fellow citizens, and very often, indeed, by York county people visiting St. John, the Mail feels that no citizen is necessary for taking up considerable space today with some discussion of matters affecting the structure.

There is no more important bridge in the province than the suspension bridge since over it there probably passes more traffic than over any other bridge in New Brunswick. Because of this fact there has been general interest in the reports which have been in circulation to the effect that the safety of the structure is very questionable and there will be general interest in the government announcement that action is to be taken toward the utilization of the cantilever bridge near the suspension bridge to replace the latter or toward the construction of a new bridge.

Mr. Lowell's Urging of Action

There are some interesting, and at the same time startling facts, to be borne in mind in connection with the bridge question. For several sessions, Mr. Lowell, an opposition member from St. John county, has been urging upon the government the necessity of action in connection with this bridge. But the government did nothing more than to intimated that Mr. Lowell was acting for a political purpose.

At the session of the legislature just closing Mr. Lowell again urged the government regarding the bridge. He addressed a series of questions to the ministry asking if a new York bridge had not reported that the bridge was unsafe. One question was as to whether or not the engineer had declared that the margin of safety was lower than prudence required. Other questions were as to when the report was received from the engineer and why it had been concealed from the public.

It developed that the report had been completed and sent to the government by the New York expert last March, when, by the way, the house was in session. Yet the government had never even informed the house that an engineer had been consulted.

When the government's answer to Mr. Lowell's questions was submitted, it was found that it was vague, a multiplicity of words being used perhaps to disguise the real facts. The reply to the direct question regarding the safety of the bridge was a mass of involved statements which no one but a bridge expert could clearly understand.

The situation had a peculiar aspect and Mr. Lowell made a point of it. After some delay the report was forthcoming. It was a mass of statements, but it was clear light on a startling fact in connection with that report as it was laid on the table. The house, however, was neither here nor there. What did the report show? It showed that Mr. Lowell's inquiries were pertinent indeed and very much in the public interest.

The engineer specifically declared that the "margin of safety" of the bridge was lower than prudence requires. In other words, he declared that the use of the bridge in its existing condition was dangerous to the people who pass over it. But the government did not see fit to answer a plain question with plain words.

Kept Back the Report

The government had been in possession of this report for more than a year. It had kept back the report from the public. It had allowed scores, hundreds, of people to use the bridge when the ministers knew from the report of the expert, the dangerous condition of the structure.

More than this, Mr. Lowell asked if the caretaker of the bridge had been instructed to restrict traffic on the structure, as had been advised by the engineer. Ministers replied that such instructions had been given. Mr. Lowell went to St. John and when he returned he informed the house that he had in his possession at the very moment affidavits showing that no such instructions had been given the caretaker. And from that day to this the ministers have not said a word in contradiction of Mr. Lowell's assertion that no instructions had been given.

What is the situation? It is simply this: That the government had in its possession for more than a year a report of the gravest importance to the people of the province, and kept back that report from the public. It has allowed the people of St. John and many of their fellow-citizens from other counties to use, without any warning of its condition, a bridge which a noted bridge expert had specifically declared to be dangerous.

More than this, the ministry did not give to the house and the country the full information which had been asked for by a representative of the people, but evaded the real point raised by the questions asked. Moreover, affidavits, which the ministry have never attempted to prove false, declare that no such instructions as the government said had been given in respect to the restriction of traffic on the bridge had been received by the man to whom they should have gone.

It is a serious matter indeed when information of such importance is withheld from the people and an attempt made, seemingly, to deceive the people. It is not a matter of dollars and cents but of danger to life. Providence alone has saved the province from a serious disaster. The government has been taking chances with the safety of the people.

Daily Hints for the Cook

TAPIoca CREAM.

Two tablespoonfuls of tapioca, a little more than a pint of milk, one quarter level teaspoonful of salt, one-third of a cup of sugar, two eggs, one teaspoonful of vanilla. Wash the tapioca and put into a double boiler and cover with the milk. If it is pearl tapioca, put it on the back of the stove, where it will just keep warm and let stand for an hour. If it is the fine tapioca, it can be cooked immediately. Stir frequently and cook until soft and transparent.

Beat the whites and yolks of the eggs separately. Gradually beat the sugar into the well beaten yolks and beat until the mixture thickens. Then quickly beat into the mixture the whites of the eggs. Continue to beat for two or three minutes. Remove from the fire and when partly cool add the flavoring. Turn into a fancy dish and set aside to cool.

QUAKING PUDDING.

Cut stale bread in thin slices, using enough to make three cups. Butter a mold or bowl thoroughly and sprinkle with currants. Fill with the bread, and currais in layers. Beat together three eggs, four tablespoonfuls of sugar, a little salt and nutmeg, and add three cups of milk and one teaspoonful of vanilla. Steam for one hour. Turn out gently on a warm plate and serve hot.

CINNAMON BREAD.

Take one pint of bread dough which has risen over night, knead into it one half cup of soft butter, one well-beaten egg, two tablespoonfuls of sugar and three or four tablespoonfuls of lukewarm water in which a pinch of baking soda has dissolved. Let the dough rise in a shallow baking pan. When it is light spread it with melted butter and sprinkle with granulated sugar and cinnamon. Bake in a moderate oven. Cut in squares and serve warm.
