World's Record Broken.
St. Paul, Minn., Feb. 24.—One world's record was broken in the fifteenth annual tournament of the International Bowling Association, a recapitulation revealed. The new world's mark was set by the Hutchinsons of Des Moines, Ia., in rolling 1,143 in the last game of their five-man event in which they totaled 8,013. The former record of 1,125 was established by the Orange Crush Squad of Peoria, Ill., three years ago. Higher single game totals have been made before in match competition, but not in tournament play.
