MONCTON GYROS WELL STARTED AT CEREMONIAL

Saint John Delegation 61 Strong Out of Membership of 75

BANQUET AND DANCE. NOTABLE EVENTS

Men From Here Stage a Novelty in Concert Line

The installation ceremony of the newly formed Moncton Gyro Club, held yesterday afternoon at the railway city, was attended by strong delegations from the Saint John, Halifax and New Glasgow clubs. The installation was performed by District Governor Arthur T. Smith of Halifax.

61 FROM SAINT JOHN.

The Saint John delegation presented a strength of 61 members present out of a total enrolment of 75. The members left Saint John on two special Pullman cars attached to the afternoon train. The trip to Moncton was enjoyed by practicing songs specially adapted for the occasion. On their arrival the boys found 15 Gyros from New Glasgow, who with the Moncton members lined the station platform and gave them a royal welcome.

The executives of the various clubs immediately went into the session while the rest of the visitors were entertained about the city and vicinity until dinner time when an elaborate banquet was served by the Gyroettes in the Masonic Temple.

SPEAKERS AT BANQUET.

President Elmer Reg. Spence, of the Moncton Club, presided, and introduced Mayor Wheeler, who officially welcomed the Gyros and presented to them the freedom of the city. The chair was then turned over to Donald W. Armstrong, president of the Saint John Club, who spoke briefly on the aims and ideals of Gyro. Other speakers included President Homer Zwicker, of Halifax; President Fred Hasen, of Halifax; Joe Key of Sarnia, Ontario; and Ken Spencer, of Moncton.

The following officers were installed by District Governor Smith: President, Reg. Spence; 1st vice president, Philip Allen; 2nd vice president, Rod McDonald; secretary, Jerome Morris; treasurer, Bill Craggie; and James D. Robertson master of ceremonies.

A feature of the banquet was the hearty singing of Gyro choruses by those present, under the leadership of Dr. Percy Bonnell with Len Wilson at the piano.

TO POINT DU CHENE.

After dinner the Gyros and their guests, to the number of about 800, motored to Point du Chene where a dance was held in the pavilion. The C. N. E. orchestra furnished music for a full program and the pavilion was tastefully decorated for the occasion and presented an attractive appearance. Refreshments were served by the ladies at midnight.

NOVELTY CONCERT.

An appreciated item of the evening's entertainment was a novel concert given by the Saint John boys under the leadership of Dr. Bonnell. COMPLAINT IS MADE BY ABBE CASGRAIN

Writes to London Times About Medical Examination of Emigrants For Canada

A cable to the Montreal Gazette from its resident London correspondent says:—

"The Abbe Philippe Casgrain, director of the Catholic Immigration Association at Quebec, asks in a letter to the Times:—

"May I enquire why Canadian emigration authorities instruct emigrants to be medically examined by doctors whose certificates they will not accept? Must emigrants break up their homes and travel 8,000 miles to ascertain whether they are mentally or physically fit to enter Canada?"

"Father Casgrain gives as a case in point the experience of a Scottish family, one of the children of which was rejected by Canada after having been passed by a doctor appointed by the Canadian authorities in England for examination purposes."

Abbe Casgrain is well known in Saint John as the Catholic chaplain who meets the newcomers to Canada here on arrival at Sand Point in the winter port season.

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PREMIER KING'S PLANS

Hon. W. L. MacKenzie King is expected to reach New Brunswick during the week commencing August 23. He will open his campaign in Edmundston and will also speak at Grand Falls, Woodstock. It was said today that it will be Mr. King's plan to confine, for the most part, his meetings to parts of New Brunswick in which he has not spoken previously. It is not known yet when he will be in Saint John. Definite announcement as to the itinerary of Hon. R. J. Manion and other Conservative speakers will be given when not available this morning.

Budget Adopted—New Trustees—Valuation and Tax Arrears

The annual school meeting was held last evening at East Saint John, with Rev. W. J. Bevis in the chair and Rupert Taylor, secretary. J. Robert son was re-elected trustee for the term, and John H. Tongue's resignation, as trustee, was regretfully accepted. Dufferin Babcock, of Little River, was elected to fill the vacancy. J. W. Flewelling is also a member of the trustee board.

The meeting voted the following estimates for the coming year: Teachers' salaries, \$6,000; fuel, light, water, and insurance, \$1,250; salary of the secretary, F. E. Josselyn, including a small amount drawn from last year, \$884; sundries, \$800. The total amount, including interest on bonds, is \$16,084.81. It was recorded that there was a sum of \$2,000 unpaid taxes from last year.

The valuation of the school district this year for assessment purposes is \$84,000. The expenses on the school district last year amounted to \$80,491.15, which included the cost of an addition to the school building.
