DEMPSEY SAYS HE WAS LUCKY TO LICK WILLARD

New York, Oct. 5.—The truth is out. Jack Dempsey beat Willard at Toledo last July unexpectedly. At least he said as much while in a confidential mood. He told local newspaper men at a dinner at which he was host that he walked into the ring on that eventful day prepared to lose with the belief that it wouldn't hurt his pugilistic reputation if he did. In other words, he felt that he had nothing to lose and all to gain. He knew, or rather felt, that Willard was a big, tough, strong fellow, and that his only chance lay in his landing a good, hard punch. He tried with all his strength in his system and put it over, and was tickled silly when the giant of a man went to the floor with a foolish expression on his face. Up to that time, according to Jack, he had no more intention or hope of winning the heavyweight championship than the man in the moon has tonight.

Dempsey has just recovered from an operation on his nose which has not proved satisfactory. Ever since, the heavyweight champion has been bothered with headaches and nose bleeds which rob him of all ambition to even box in a gymnasium. According to himself he is in need of almost continuous sleep. In fact when awake he is all out of sorts.

Jack Kearns, who manages Dempsey, with Berckert, the English sensation, says he has under consideration a fabulous offer for Dempsey's services in England, but up to date he hasn't seen fit to answer them.

At present Dempsey has a profitable engagement with a circus.

CANADA AND THE STEEL STRIKE IN STATES

In its summary of the steel, iron, metal and machinery markets for week ended Oct. 2, Canadian Machinery and Manufacturing News, Toronto, makes the following comment:

How long can Canadian industry stand the steel strike in the United States? That question is concerning a lot of people just now. There are plants that will not feel the pinch for weeks yet. On a broad basis, though, it can be accepted as a fact that it is not possible for industry on this side of the line to prosper while the same business across the border is in the throes of a desperate strike.

The strike came at a bad season for the year for Canadian business. Warehouse stocks are very low in many lines. Roughly speaking, plates, tubes and large structural steel are the lines that we must import, and there are certain shortages in sheets that are much in demand, with only a limited production capacity in Canada. Buying from warehouses has been very brisk for several weeks; these places are pretty well cleaned out.

Prices will be firm and higher on many lines. One user of sheets, for instance, who wanted twenty tons, found that the time he had made the rounds of several houses to secure his requirements, he had to pay \$400 more than he bargained for. Although the actual lists may not be altered, the chances are that premiums will be secured on all lines many lines where there is any chance of delivery.

It might be supposed, at first glance, that Canadian steel mills would benefit largely from the strike. They may for a short time, but not in the long run. For instance, if a factory cannot secure plates, it will be only a matter of time before it will be closed out and out of the market as a buyer of those lines the Canadian mills are in a position to ship.

WOULD RATHER RENT THAN BUY OWN HOME (Financial Post).

"People are not buying our houses because we cannot convince them that it is cheaper for them to own their own homes than to pay rent," said W. Swain, secretary of the Toronto Housing Commission, explaining to The Financial Post one reason why the commission has a surplus of homes on the market, that they cannot find buyers for. At present the commission has 229 houses under construction, which will be ready for occupancy within the next month or two, but only 100 persons have seriously offered to purchase. There are about a dozen completed homes on the market, on the average. A payment of \$10 per cent is demanded, and terms are arranged for the remainder so that the principal, interest, taxes and insurance amount to about \$30 a month. At the end of twenty years, this monthly payment has purchased the house. Despite the fact that similar houses throughout the city rent for \$30 and \$40 a month, "people refuse to buy the Housing Commission's houses. Mr. Swain tells a woman who asked how much it would cost to buy a house from the commission. She was told that it would cost her \$31 a month. She refused to buy because her rent was only \$30, and no amount of argument would convince her that part of her \$31 a month constituted an investment while her \$30 a month was an unrecouped gratuity. There has been some objection to making the \$30 initial payment, as the commission has reduced the amount, and in the case of returned soldiers, assignments of war service gratuity have been taken. The commission claims that the homes could not be duplicated at the price under conditions today, though one Toronto real estate dealer is quoted as saying that the homes are not good value at the price of \$3,500.

NEW ASSOCIATION MAY SUCCEED OLD ORGANIZATION AT FAIR VALE

At a special meeting of the Fair Vale Outing Association called Friday evening by the president for the purpose of electing trustees the question of purchasing the Garde property for the erection of a pavilion arose. The deal had been closed and the committee ordered to purchase, but in the meantime some objections and the pavilion question was thoroughly gone into. As a result a vote was taken and when counted was a tie. A motion was then made that the funds now on hand be deposited with \$500 to be given to the Protestant Orphanage and \$500 to the Catholic Sisters of Charity; that all bills be paid and all material and land owned by the association be sold at public auction and the money equally divided between the Protestant and Catholic orphanages. A resolution against the removal of

the present railway station was also passed and it was urged that if a railway station was to be erected it should be on the present site.

The present outing association is a matter of history, but it is said that a stronger and better association is to be formed in the near future.
