General Intelligence.

Death in a Lime Kiln.

TERRIBLE FATE OF TWO CHILDREN
ROSELLE, N. B., July 10.—John E.
Cameron lives on a farm one mile
from the village. He has a lime kiln
a quarter of a mile from his house,
near the main road. Yesterday he
started a fire in it and went away to
his work in a hay field. Two of his
children, a boy nine years old and a
girl aged five were playing about the
kiln. Over the mouth of the kiln is a
windlass by which a large bucket is
lowered to the bottom. The oldest of
the two children thought it would be
nice to ride his little sister up and
down in the bucket. She clambered in,
and he let her down into the pit.
The fire had by that time got under
control, and the stone was becom-
ing heated and emitted poisonous gas.

The little girl screamed to come up,
and her brother tried to pull up the
bucket, but could not start it. After
several attempts, he started on a run
for home, where he told his mother
and grand-mother, who were alone
in the house, the situation as above.
The two women ran to the kiln.—
Mrs. Cameron saw her child lying on
the bottom. She had fallen over the
bucket, being overpowered by the
gas. Finding that the child might be
restored if taken out at once, Mrs.
Cameron drew the bucket up, and
her little boy ran to it, and telling
him to place the body of the little
girl in it as quick as possible, and get
back into it himself, she lowered him
into the noxious chamber a few feet
upward, when he succumbed to the
influence of the gas and fell back un-
conscious to the bottom.

Mrs. Cameron drew the body of her
little girl to the top and hastily re-
moved it from the bucket and placed
it on the ground. She then gave the
crank of the windlass to her mother-
in-law, a lady nearly seventy years
old, and told her to lower her quickly
into the pit, to the rescue of her other
child. She got into the bucket.
Her weight was more than old Mrs.
Cameron could manage, and she was
slipped from her hands, and whirling
round struck her on the head and
knocked her senseless to the ground.
Her daughter-in-law was lowered vi-
olently to the bottom of the kiln, and
no doubt rendered unconscious be-
fore she reached the bottom. The
Pottsville stage came along about
the time Mrs. Cameron was lowered
into the kiln. John Kane, the driver,
saw the accident, and stopped. He
discovered the bodies of the other
two in the kiln. Calling a gentleman
from the stage to aid, he went down
into the kiln by means of the wind-
lass rope, and placed the body of
Mrs. Cameron in the bucket. It was
drawn up and laid on the ground.
Kane succeeded in getting into the
bucket with the boy's body, but be-
came unconscious soon afterward,
and was taken from the bucket in
that state. It was some time before
he was restored.

The Indian War.

The New York Herald contains an
account of the Indian war in the
Indians, fought by General Crook
command, at Rosebud, Wyoming
Territory, on June the seventeenth.
While the American troops did not
suffer such an awful slaughter as that
inflicted upon the forces under Gen-
eral Crook, it is estimated that over
the very guarded account of the Her-
ald's correspondent, that they were
taken by surprise and suffered a se-
rious check, ending in a retreat, which
fortunately did not draw the Sioux
after them. General Crook appears
to have set out with a force of 1100
surprising an Indian village, and
to have come upon it suddenly, scarcely
being aware of its proximity until the
Indians were charging him. The
cause assigned for this disgraceful
surprise is defective scouting on the
part of the Indian allies, but it seems
strange that white scouts were not
employed in addition to the friendly
Indians. Colonel Royal, who led the
attack, is said to have been "circum-
scribed by orders" from his command-
ing officer, and it is this that corre-
spondent seems to attribute the failure
to injure the Sioux more severely
than was done. These latter are re-
ported to be badly crippled, but there
does not seem to be any certainty as
to their losses, and they certainly had
the best of the encounter. There was
about a hundred lives lost on the side
of the troops, which was bad enough,
indeed, but if the retreating forces
were pursued by the Indians, the
casualties would probably have been
much greater. Altogether the affair,
as recounted by the correspondent,
