Terrible Doings in Provinces. St. Petersburg, Dec. 22.—Papers which are being distributed by thous-ands to the workmen are filled with the most inflammatory appeals, and sting the people to an armed rebellion. Many of the articles are especially di-rected to the army, which is implored, not to shed the blood of the nation. One writer addressing the soldlers said: "Join us. Rise with us. No power can stand against the people and the army united." The strike calk, in addition to mak-ing the regular demands for a con-stituent assembly, universal suffrage, to the abolition of martial law, immun-ity of the person and the other features of the Workmen's Council, the discon-tinuation of political suits, acquiese-ence with the petitons of the army and navy and of the railroad and postal telegraph employes for an increase of pay, the transfer of the land to the people, an eight-hour day and the abol-tion of all restrictions regarding na-tionalities and religion. *Freedom or Slavery.* The preamble reads: "Citizens, freedom or slavery? Is Russia to be governed by the people or robbed by a band of thieves? Let us stop industry, commerce, and com-munications throughout the country or robbed by a band of thieves? Let us stop industry, commerce, and com-munications throughout the country and with one united effort overthrow the last vestige of autocracy. To the whip, sword, and machine gun let us oppose the revolutionary bayonet. Fin-ancial ruin threatens to engulf the Government. One more blow and the wile regime will be ended." No Prayers For Czar. It is significant that the workmen in the mills and factories have for more than a week been presenting demands that the priests discontinue the usual prayers for the Emperor, with the al-ternative of being boycotted if they did not cease doing so. Train Leaves Warsaw. At noon yesterday the continental train left the Warsaw station with military engine drivers, and a strong guard of soldiers. The tender and loco-motive were old, the strikers having rendered all the others useless. Two files of soldiers were drawn up on the platform.

Carnegie Supplements Ten Million Foundation With Five Millions.

New York, Dec. 22.—It was an-nounced from Boston yesterday, says The Herald, that, the "Carnegic Foun-dation." a sum of \$10,000,000 given by Andrew Carnegie to provide relief for meedy teachers and professors in uni-versities, colleges and technical schools in the United States, Canada and New-foundiand, is to be forthwith increased by the addition of \$5,000,000. At the same time the restrictions which pro-hibited aid from being extended to members of the faculties of sectarian and state-aided institutions, are to be removed, the statement declares. It is further declared that Mr. Car-negie has announced his willingness to add still another large sum to the "Foundation" should the managers deem such a move essential to its suc-cess.
