OPENING SESSION OF SOVEREIGN MOINES, IOWA.

Des Moines, Ia., Sept. 16. — The 78th annual session of the Sovereign Grand Lodge of Oddfellows was formally welcomed to this city yesterday by Governor A. B. Cummins and Mayor Brenton in a public session in the new suditorium.

When the Sovereign Grand Lodge was formally called to order, the report of the Grand Sire was submitted. It showed that there were 127 grand lodges testablished, of which six were in foreign countries.

The total number of subordinate lodges is 12,792, and of insubordinate, 2,780.

The entire membership of the order

reached 1,002,272.

During the year there were 99,393 initiations in the subordinate lodges, including those initiated in other branches. The total reached 185,845.

The amount of relief disbursed was \$3,393,785, an increase of \$203,093.

The financial statements shows:
Revenues from all branches, \$10,826,-976.66; increase, \$660,025.19; expenses, \$8,793,195.31; increase, \$436,355.93; surplus revenues, \$2,030,775.35; invested fundc, \$25,952,769.38; increase, \$1,309,-076.28.
