GENERAL NEWS. THE LAST FRENCH RELEASES.—Corporal Chambers the only remaining military French prisoner was released on Monday of last week.

THE GOVERNOR GENERAL.—The Governor-General has accepted the invitation to become the guest of Montreal, with Lady Dufferin, on their Excelsior tour, next month. The public dinner will take place on the 11th and 12th on the 13th prox.

OPENING OF THE ENGLISH PARLIAMENT.—The usual official circulars have been issued requesting the attendance of supporters of the Government at the opening of Parliament. The circulars both to Lord and Commons intimate that matters of importance will immediately engage their attention.

ANOTHER CASE FOR ARBITRATION.—A number of Americans who took possession of the Morant Keys, a dependency of Jamaica, and established a Guano Company there, have been taken off by a British steamer. The leader, a Captain Jensen, protests that he discovered the Keys, and claims possession in the name of the United States.

RECENT ADVICES FROM THE WEST INDIES.—Recent advices from the West Indies are very unfavorable to the fish trade. Several Halifax vessels have sold their cargoes below cost and one has been ordered to bring her cargo back to Halifax. This is probably the first instance in the history of the Halifax West India trade of a vessel bringing her cargo of fish home again.

PROVING AWAY.—The St. John Freeman is still pegging away at Freeman's, and does not appear to be pleased because when grand bodies of the Order in such irreligious countries as France, South America, Mexico, Central America, and Cuba have dispensed with a belief in God and their action is protested against by the rest of the Masonic World.

THE GOVERNMENT AND THE WEATHER.—The following letter, signed "A Penning, Lunenburg," appears in the Barrie, Ont., Gazette: "What is the reason that this Great Government, 40 years ago, towards getting some snow for us this winter? I am sure were John A. at the head of affairs we should have plenty of it. As it is now our men and teams are nearly all idle, while so many are anxious for work."

THE SCOTCH IRISH FISHERY.—The estimate given last year as to the probable totals of the fishery has again been verified, the entire "take" over the whole Scottish seaboard being about 700,000 barrels, the quantity cured being, as appears by the recently issued report of the Fishery Board for Scotland, slightly above 550,000 barrels, or about 245,000 barrels under the quantity cured in the previous year. The falling off is accounted for by the unfavorable weather which prevailed during the greater part of the fishing season.

STEEL RE-IRON.—Important experiments were made at Portmouth lately in the presence of the director of naval ordnance, the Heavy Gun Committee, and representatives of the German, Austrian, and Italian Governments, the object being to determine whether steel is better iron for armor plating for ships. Four plates, each 9 inches thick, were fired at with a 12-in gun, charged with 60 lbs of powder and a 250 lb projectile. The distance from the gun to the plate was 300 feet. The plates cost the manufacturers nearly £1,000 each. The results of the experiments were not regarded as favorable to the substitution of steel for iron.

REPAIRING THE BURNING OF ST. JOHN. Mr. E. J. Russell is engaged on a picture of the burning of St. John, which he is printing by a lithographic process from stones prepared by himself and after his own drawings. The sketches were made while the fire was in progress, the point of observation being the west side of the harbor.
