


LAURIER GOVERNMENT SWEEPED FROM POWER; CONSERVATIVES HAVE ABOUT 50 MAJORITY

Special to The Standard Ottawa, Sept. 21.—The Laurier government has been swept from power on a resolute wave of anti-reciprocity sentiment and righteous indignation at the regime of graft and scandal with which Canada has been cursed for the last fifteen years.




PREMIER HAZON ON THE RESULT

In response to a request from the Associated Press of the United States, for a statement on the outcome of the elections, Hon. J. D. Hazon, last night sent the following message: "The result of the elections shows that Canada is not for sale. There is nothing but good feeling for our friends South of the border, but Canada resented the efforts of the Hearst yellow journals and the enormous flood of money provided by the American trusts and put forward for the purpose of sand-bagging the free people of the Dominion into renouncing their allegiance to the British flag."

"Canada has decided for all time to continue an integral part of the British Empire, and has in most emphatic terms, re-echoed the sentiment of the Loyalist ancestors of New Brunswick, who, for the sake of loyalty to the British flag and constitution, left their prosperous and happy homes in the New England States at the close of the war of the American Revolution, and laid broad and deep in this great north country, an undying love for British institutions and the Union Jack."

would make a noise. Along Charlotte street, King, Union and Prince William streets, thousands of persons paraded and it was a gala time. When the word was circulated that there was no doubt that the Government had been overthrown and that the loyal Conservatives had won the day the demonstration was intensified and when it was time for the thousands to leave the St. Andrew's rink they did not leave until they captured Dr. J. W. Daniel and H. A. Powell and carried them on the shoulders of a large number of stalwarts. Headed by a brass band there was a parade up Charlotte street as far as Union street. Prominent in the lead of the parade was the good old Union Jack, a large one that stretched across the street. While the band played, the thousands in the parade sang "Rule Britannia," "O Canada," and other patriotic songs.

After Union street had been reached there was a return march down the street and Messrs. Daniel and Powell were placed in an automobile and the parade was renewed with vigor. The two Conservatives were escorted to their homes by thousands, and were left there with cheering by a multitude. The cheering could be heard all over the city. The crowd then dispersed and wended their way towards their homes, and as each section went through the city they sang and made things merry.

Windows were raised along the line of march taken by the men and the joyous cry was raised that Canada had a new and an honest government. While thousands went home hundreds of other joyful Conservatives remained on the streets and in the restaurants and made merry. On nearly every section of King street were groups singing and cheering. On the corner of Charlotte street and King square there were a couple of hundred men about one o'clock this morning. There were cheers for the King, cheers for the new government, and then the singing of Rule Britannia, O Canada, and the National Anthem.
