AVIATOR DESTROYS
MEXICAN GUNBOAT

The Mexican federal gunboat Tampico was destroyed by a bomb dropped from an aeroplane over Guaymas Harbor, according to an official message from the constitutionalists.

Didier Masson, aviator, who on June 19 flew over the field at the battle of Ortiz and dropped bombs that killed fifty-two men in the command of General Ojeda, made the flight that resulted in the loss of the war ship. He made three journeys over the harbor, it is reported, before he finally landed a bomb on the vessel.
