KINGS COUNTY COUNCIL MET YESTERDAY

First Session of Annual Meeting—E. A. Flewelling New Warden - By-law Adopted.

Hampton, Jan. 27.—At the annual session of the municipality of Kings county this morning it became necessary to elect a new warden, and E. A. Flewelling, a councillor for Kings town, and F. E. Sharp, councillor for Springfield were nominated. A tie vote was the result, and a ballot resulted in another tie. A motion to rescind the nominations was then adopted.

Three additional names were put in nomination, Councillor Thomas Gilliland, Rothsey, William Jameson, Sussex, and S. H. Flewelling, Hampton. Councillor Jameson's name, on motion, was withdrawn, leaving four candidates. This new ballot disclosed the following result: E. A. Flewelling, 16; F. E. Sharp, 13; Thomas Gilliland, 9; S. H. Flewelling, 9; W. Jameson, 1. Councillor E. A. Flewelling was accordingly declared elected warden and took his seat with a brief address of thanks and claim for co-operation during his office.

Councillor Sharp also returned thanks for the support accorded to him, and expressed his ambition to secure the honor of warden as representative of an important parish which had not had a representative in the chair for thirty years.

The report in full was adopted. An assessment of \$171.75 was ordered on the Parish of Upland for road damages and expenses. The report of the Printing Committee for 1913 was read and approved. The Finance Committee reported passage on a number of bills which were ordered paid.

The report of Dr. H. F. Wetmore, chairman of the local Board of Health, was read and approved. It showed that during 1913 there had been forty cases of infectious disease of which there were seven cases of diphtheria with two deaths, six cases of scarlet fever (one death), typhoid fever, eight cases with one death; measles, twenty cases, no deaths; tuberculosis, three cases, one death.

Bills amounting to \$74.26 are in the hands of the Finance Committee. The report of the Municipal Home was read by Mr. Atherton, an accountant appointed to investigate and re-

port on accounts for past eight years. It showed all bills paid but that the commissioners are handicapped by not getting sufficient money to meet engagements which they make. It was resolved that the secretary-treasurer be required to pay to the commissioners twenty-five per cent of the annual estimates for each quarter commencing March 31st, 1914. A report of the committee appointed last year to enquire into the condition of the financial affairs of the commissioners was read by the secretary and ordered to be embodied in the printed minutes of the council.

A resolution of sympathy and regret was ordered to be sent to Council Geo. W. Bruce, Kingston, who is prevented from attending council by reason of a painful affliction and the secretary-treasurer was further authorized to make recommendations to the council should he receive the amount due notices or interruptions at public meetings, concerts or other entertainments and a penalty of \$10, that fire arms shall not be carried publicly on the person of any one on Sunday, that fire crackers, squibs, or other fireworks shall not be set off or bonfires lighted on or near any street or highway under penalty of \$10; that any fine imposed under these by-laws shall subject the delinquent to imprisonment in the county goal for a period of not less than twenty days.

A further batch of bills was sent in from the Finance Committee and passed in bulk. The clerk of the Council, J. T. Alexander, notified the council of the insufficient heating arrangement in the court room at the last session of the county court and ordered to be remedied with the report of the building committee. Adjourned until 10 a. m. Wednesday.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District in which the land is situated at the office of any Local Agent of Dominion Lands (not sub-agent) on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required in every case, except when residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section of available Dominion land, 25 acres. Duties—Six months residence in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and 50 acres extra, outside the area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of forest, scrubby or timbered area, as reported by Homestead Inspector on application for patent.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price, \$5 per acre. Duties—Six months residence for three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$200.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST MINING REGULATIONS.

COAL.—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty-one years, renewable at an annual rental of \$1 an acre. Not more than 2,500 acres can be leased to one applicant. Royalty, five cents per acre on the claim year, or paid to the mining Recorder. When \$500.00 has been expended on the claim, the tract must be staked out by the applicant, and personal application to the Agent or Sub-Agent of Dominion Lands for the district, must in all cases be made and the rental for the first year must be paid to the agent within thirty days after staking.

PLACER MINING CLAIMS are 500 feet long and from 1,000 to 2,000 feet wide. Entry fee, \$10.00. Not less than \$100 must be expended in development work each year.

PREDIGGING.—Two leases of five miles each of a river may be issued to one applicant for a term of 20 years, at \$10 a mile per annum. Royalty, 2 1/2 per cent on the output of the river.
