Y. W. C. A. TRAVELLERS' AID.

The first meeting of the Young Women's Christian Association to be held in their own quarters took place yesterday afternoon when a meeting of the Directors assembled at the Travellers' Aid on Union-street.

For The Travellers Aid Miss Hoyt reported meeting 108 trains, 4 boats.

She had assisted and directed 51 grown up people and 10 children to places of safety. Her work begins at seven a.m. and ends after the Boston train arrives which is very often late and she also meets Sunday trains.

USEFUL HINTS.

(1) Salt on fingers when cleaning fowl, meat, or fish, will prevent slipping.

Salt thrown on a coal fire which is slow will revive it.

Salt used in sweeping carpets keeps out moths.

(3) Vinegar will set dubious greens and blues in gingham.

Vinegar is an antidote for poisoning by alkalis.

Vinegar will brighten copper.

Vinegar and brown paper will heal bruise or "black eye."

Vinegar and sugar will make a good stove polish.

A GARDEN APRON.

This calls for three-fourths of a yard of denim. Turn a narrow hem and feather stitch across; turn up one-fourth of a yard and feather stitch up and down, leaving spaces large enough to slip the hand in easily and making the space in the centre wider.

These pockets are for holding twine, scissors, etc. The apron should have a belt with button and button hole.


