MOTOR LICENSES

BRING PROVINCE OVER \$200,000

Fredericton, N. B., Dec. 28.—Receipts from motor vehicle license fees for the calendar year of 1920 in New Brunswick have been considerably more than \$200,000, according to an announcement made today by Hon. P. J. Vennart, minister of public works, who is here from Bathurst today in departmental business.

Collections of motor vehicle license fees for the fiscal year which ended on October 31 last, he said, had amounted to \$198,000 and there had been several thousand dollars received since then.

Here also the pastor, the Rev. S. Hilyard and his wife were remembered with a cash present. The congregations at both churches dispersed at a late hour in the best of Christmas mood. This mood was all the richer for the fact that any poor of the community had not been overlooked at the Christmas tide.

Hon. R. W. Wigmore On Port Development

Says St. John Has Not Been Neglected—Now Preparing Estimates of Work Needed.

Hon. Rupert W. Wigmore, minister of customs and inland revenue, arrived in the city yesterday accompanied by Mrs. Wigmore, to spend a few days. They are guests at the home of Mr. J. Terry.

Port Development.

The Honorable Minister was asked last night for a word on port development that would encourage and scatter a little Christmas cheer among St. John people. The Minister replied that St. John had not been forgotten nor was it to be neglected in any way. He says he is getting things in line to make his fight before the Cabinet and parliament for the port what it needs and must have.

Preparing Estimates.

He is now engaged in the preparation of estimates on the work required in furthering the development of harbor facilities and that, in itself is no very sweet task. These estimates, he says, must first go before the Cabinet, then for consideration and revision, if necessary, and then to parliament for the final action. With parliament not meeting before February 1 is quite reasonable to assume that there will be nothing done in the way of work on the port before summer.

Greatly Encouraged.

The Minister feels greatly encouraged over the prospect of the port's needs meeting favorable consideration at the hands of parliament. "There are many demands being made upon the government requiring the expenditure of large sums of money," said the Minister. "In these strenuous times all cannot be acted upon favorably. But I feel everything is looking up for St. John and am encouraging."

Brown, who was recently promoted to Montreal as assistant general manager of Eastern Lines, was waited upon in his office here this afternoon by C. N. R. officials and presented with a case of sterling silver and two side dishes. The deceased was one of the best known residents of the city, and was in the eighty-fifth year of his age. He was born in Shediac, and was a son of the late Hon. Daniel Hanington. For some time he conducted a drug store and post office in Shediac, afterwards coming to St. John where he went into partnership with his brother in the drug business until 1917, when they were burned out. He then conducted a commission business for a time and was appointed Postmaster, which position he held for over twenty years and was superannuated.

He leaves one son, F. E. Hanington, and four daughters, Mrs. James Manning and Mrs. H. C. Wetmore, of this city; Miss Gertrude Hanington, of Boston; and Mrs. Geo. A. Harper, of Winnipeg; also two brothers, Dr. James T. of Montreal, and C. F. of Ottawa; also one sister, Mrs. W. S. Croft, of Montreal.

The funeral will be held from the late residence, Thursday afternoon service at 3.30 o'clock.

C. N. R. WORKMEN STOP FREIGHTS FOR STEEL CO.

Embargo is Now in Effect Against Two Nova Scotia Industries.

REFUSE TO TOUCH ANY CONSIGNMENTS

Board of Arbitration Must Settle Strike Before Work Starts Again.

Sydney, N. S., Dec. 28.—An embargo on all shipments to and from the plants of the Dominion Steel Company was signed by the four general chairmen of the C. N. R. Brotherhood of Railway Employees on Monday night last.

Officials of the Dominion Steel Company maintain the attitude of aloofness with respect to the embargo and last night refused to discuss the situation in any form. It is not definitely known what the company proposes to do, but officers of the railwaymen here declared that freight sent into the C. N. R. yards at Sydney would not be handled by any C. N. R. employees.

The embargo order was issued to W. A. Kingsland, general manager of the eastern line, C. N. R., on Dec. 29, and was signed by the four general chairmen of the C. N. R. Brotherhood of Railway Employees. The letter to Mr. Kingsland declares that the C. N. R. men would refuse to handle any material or calls to or from the properties of the Dominion Iron and Steel Co., and the N. S. Steel and Coal Co., after Dec. 28, and until such time as these companies agree to submit the questions in dispute to arbitration.

Avoiding Arbitration. Toronto, Dec. 28.—President D. B. Hanna, of the C. N. R., stated today that the Board of Directors did not intend to be drawn voluntarily into the work and operations of the recently appointed Board of Conciliation, which was recently appointed by the Minister of Labor to look into the dispute over Order 48, which was issued some time ago in reference to participation of employees in the political arena.

The Board of Directors of the Canadian National Railway, said President Hanna, today, "notified the Minister of Labor that they could not consistently with their appointment as directors under which the railway was to be operated free from political nomination any one to represent them in this matter. No communication of the question by stating that men have been dismissed can get away from the main issue."

"The Board of Directors of the C. N. R. accepted office on the distinct understanding that politics would have no place in the administration of the railway," continued Mr. Hanna. "We are standing strictly on that declaration."

SIG SUIT SETTLED. New York, Dec. 28.—The \$100,000,000 stockholders' suit against Wm. Rockefeller and other former directors of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad, today was ordered discontinued by Federal Judge Hough. A compromise had been effected.

The terms of the compromise provide that the defendants, against whom was charged waste and mismanagement, shall pay the New York \$2,500,000. Lawyers involved in the case were awarded \$33,332.
