

TWO COURTS IN IRELAND CAUSE OF QUEER DOINGS

Double Actions Frequently Result Because of the Two Sets of Judicial Tribunals.

Dublin, April 23.—Existence in Ireland of two sets of judicial tribunals, the Republican courts and the old courts of the King, has resulted in some queer legal anomalies, as both courts are recognized by the government as valid, and their decisions do not always coincide.

One of the most notable of these "double actions" cases concerned a book-maker who entered suit in King's Court against a man who refused to pay his personal losses, said to exceed his winnings with the same book-maker by 20 times. The defendant pleaded the Gaming Acts, prohibiting legal proceedings to collect gambling debts, won his case, and the book-maker added counsel fees to his losses.

Hardly was the case decided in King's Court when the defendant entered suit against the book-maker in a Republican court, demanding judgment for the amount of his winnings. The astonished book-maker, realizing that he could not afford to jeopardize his trade by taking refuge unduly in the Gaming Acts as his client had done, found that the question before the court was merely whether the horses named in the action had won. When due proof of this was submitted, judgment was again entered against the book-maker.

Flying Boat Defeats Death In Race To Save Woman

Covered Hundred Miles in Hour and Half With Physician and Nurse.

Details of a race with death participated in by a slow sailing schooner and a high-powered flying boat with a woman's life 100 miles away on an island, ended against time and saved by the plane were given out today by C. F. Redden, president of the Aero-Marine Airways, Inc., Times Building, New York.

The news came to Mr. Redden by wire from Miami, Florida, one of the air bases of the Aero-Marine Company. "The schooner 'Lilla' put into Nassau after four and a half days," said Mr. Redden, "in travelling at her best speed from Norman Castle, on the island of Little Abaco in the Bahamas. It brought the word that Mrs. Lottie Russell, wife of Roy Russell, manager of the Bahamas Islands Importing and Exporting Corporation, was in a critical condition and unable to live unless immediate aid was rushed to her. There were no physicians on the island and the skipper asked that one be rushed there in the fastest boat available. Even then, her condition was so desperate that he considered the odds greatly against the sick woman. He gravely doubted if aid could reach her in time. Every minute might mean life or death."

"While the captain of the schooner was seeking a swift boat to make the return trip and others were summoning a physician and a nurse, Dr. Graham and Miss Nellie Burns, he chanced upon Duke Schiller, pilot of the Aero-Marine flying boat 'Florida,' who had just entered the harbor from Miami. Schiller at once tendered the use of the plane and volunteered to put off immediately. When the physician and nurse arrived they were hurried into the big plane and began a race to save a woman believed to be on the verge of death."

"The 100 miles they covered in one hour and a half against the four days and a half for the schooner—and were at the bedside of Mrs. Russell within two hours. Expert medical attention brought her from the shadow and she gradually improved. Schiller returned and at Nassau met Ed. Musick, piloting the big 11-passenger enclosed cabin Aero-Marine flying boat 'Colonbus' also sent out of Miami. Musick flew his ship to the island and found Mrs. Russell recovering and in such condition that the physician was able to return, leaving the nurse to care for her."

"WEEDING OUT" IN POST OFFICE AIMS TO INCREASE EFFICIENCY

"Survival of Fittest" Policy Adopted in Efforts to Bring Personnel to Pre-War Strength in U. S.

Washington, April 24.—Needless temporary and inefficient employees in the postal service all over the United States are being weeded out by a staff of efficient experts. Officials of the Post Office Department said today that the checking up process in Boston, Cleveland, New York, St. Louis, San Francisco and other large cities has resulted in a big saving in expenses.

The work in Boston, it was said, has been completed and the net saving in operations there is estimated at \$100,000 a year. In Cleveland the expenses have been cut \$300,000. In New York the work has not been completed, but the saving is expected to run approximately \$500,000.

This has been accomplished by putting temporary or auxiliary workers back on to the inactive list, and by reducing the number of hours they have been working. Regular employees on the statutory roster have not been struck by the wave of economy, and officials said that the growing postal business will probably "save them from the axe" wretches.

Hughes Work, Postmaster General, has let it be known that there will be a thorough examination of the service to ascertain where economies can be effected, better service given the public and expenses reduced.

Thirty Dropped in Capital. Officials of the department said that since the war has there been a thorough combing of the service to weed out duplication and unnecessary employment of "auxiliaries." The auxiliary employees made up the list of part-time workers who are called to duty from time to time to meet rushes in business.

It was explained by one of the efficiency experts that the tendency in the postal service to draw upon the auxiliary list too extensively and to employ auxiliaries for too long a

period all add to the cost of running the department. In Washington the declamation was begun by dropping 30 temporary and inefficient employees. Twenty-one of these were classes temporary workers and the rest were said to be inefficient and not necessary. Most of them were employed in the stamp division handling the proprietary stamps, which were used during the war for the Treasury Department.

The plan inaugurated is to inspect the operations at all the larger stations in the country—some fifty having been listed for the examination. In the efficiency programme it is said employee organizations are united with the Postmaster General. Their view is that an efficient force makes it easier for the hard working employees to climb in the service.

The weeding out process is a part of the general plan of the post office administration to put the entire service on a basis to meet the growing business. In the larger cities, where the business has grown to tremendous proportions, the "two-division" plan of handling business will be put in operation.

Large Surplus Remains. In New York it has already gone into effect. It will soon be applied in Chicago, St. Louis, Boston and other large cities. Briefly, the plan is to have two assistant postmasters, instead of one as at present. One assistant would have charge of all finances and the other, mailing operations. The division heads in each of these branches would report to the assistant postmaster.

Retrenchment in government expenditures has been pledged by the Republican administration. Employees are being dropped right and left. There are 70,000 clerks still in departments and bureaus, as compared with 112,000 at the time of the armistice. This compares with some 40,000 before the war.

Pilgrimage To Sacred Tenno Shrine For Prince of Wales

Will Have Opportunity of Witnessing Japan's Veneration for Great Leaders of Past.

Tokio, April 24.—Japan's veneration for her great leaders of the past will be brought home to the Prince of Wales when he is taken on a pilgrimage to the sacred Tenno shrine, bordering on the ancient capital of Kyoto, burial place of Meiji Tenno, father of the present ruler and the great grandfather of the restoration period; and of Jimmu Tenno, founder of the empire.

The Meiji tomb is situated at Mamoyama, a wooded eminence some five miles from Kyoto, a spot which the late emperor is said to have chosen as his last resting place. The tomb itself is remarkably simple, consisting of a huge mound of concrete, covered with 300,000 minute slabs of white granite, and so constructed as to withstand the ravages of time and nature. The mound rests on a terraced slope, behind which, amphitheatric like, is a grove of trees, the open space being covered with the white sand, while round it is a double line of stone fences pierced by "tori" gates bearing the imperial insignia.

This district is particularly rich in historical associations. It is the site of the famous palace of the dictator Hideyoshi, built in 1594 but now completely destroyed. It is said to have been the most magnificent mansion ever built in Japan. Here, too, not far from the Meiji tomb is the mausoleum of the Emperor Kwammu, who in 792 founded the imperial capital of Kyoto, a distinction which belonged to this city until Meiji Tenno moved to Tokio in modern times.

The mausoleum of Jimmu Tenno is built on the low hill of Utsuki overlooking the romantic land of Yamato, where in the dim ages, was founded the empire of Japan. It is a large mound of tumulus of stone and earth, surrounded by ancient trees and a double line of moats.

To both these tombs are attached shrines, simple and severe in aspect, perfect examples of Shinto architecture. That dedicated to the founder of Japan is situated at Kasliwahara, at the foot of Mt. Utsuki, while the Meiji Shrine, recognition of that Emperor's long connection with Tokio, has been erected in the present-day capital.

New Occupation Open To Young Husky Athletes

Candidates Opposing Government at Budapest Use Them for Bodyguards.

Budapest, April 22.—A new occupation, open only to young huskies not afraid to fight, has been set up as a result of intensive campaigning for the pending elections.

Candidates opposing the government have met with such pronounced hostility that they now employ as many athletic young men as their campaign funds will permit to act as bodyguards, body guards, spotters and shields for the speakers.

Opposition candidates decided to buy protection after dozens of their meetings had been broken up by bands of the notorious "Awakening Hungarians" who acquired remarkable skill at heaving cabbage and soft tomatoes, stinging bombs and occasionally bricks during acts of political enthusiasm.

Hordes of Russian Refugees Flocking Into Berlin

Proving Problem to Police as They Insist on Their Own Customs.

Berlin, April 24.—Hordes of Russian refugees are flocking here on every train. The arrivals have settled themselves in a section of the city which they occupy almost to the exclusion of other nationalities, and have opened their own restaurants, clubs, saloons and theatres. Some of the Russians are wealthy, but most of them are penniless.

The police have found them a problem as they insist upon their own customs, and have little commerce with the Germans. The greatest difficulty is to observe the one o'clock closing regulation. They follow the Russian custom of beginning dinner after midnight, and continuing their eating and drinking until daylight.

In several of these restaurants former wealthy Russians are working as waiters, cooks, or entertainers. A prince and his wife, a baron, and another of their countrymen constitute the orchestra in one small eating place. They were bankrupted by the revolution and must work or starve. Profiteers who made fortunes out of the Russian revolution frequent the cafes in this quarter, where they have become conspicuous because of their lavish expenditures.

The German newspapers complain that the great influx of easterners has deprived Berlin of its German character. One paper asserts Germany's capital city has become "a foreign colony, as surely as it would have become if our enemies had marched in and taken it."

Government quarters, which have shown little concern for the financial plight of the refugees, have suddenly become intensely interested in the new arrivals, particularly from Poland and Russia, fearing an epidemic of typhus and cholera. SOCIALISTS ARE AT LOGGERHEADS

Joint Declaration at Berlin Meets Criticism — Radek Predicts Change of Policy.

Berlin, April 19.—The recent meeting here of the international Socialist organizations continues to attract wide international notice, and some divergence of opinion as to its results. Careful inquiry now shows that the executives of the three international organizations at their meeting on April 5 adopted and signed a joint declaration, the main features of which are in the following five points, which they urge the proletarians of all nations to support by public mass demonstrations during the Genoa conference, preferably on April 20, but if impossible on that date owing to the difficulties of organization or otherwise, then on May 1.

Five Points.

First—An eight-hour day.

Second—Combating unemployment, which has been aggravated immeasurably by the reparations policy of capitalist powers.

Third—United action for the proletarian against the capitalist offensive.

Fourth—The Russian revolution, the half-starving Russia, entering political and economic relations of all nations with Soviet Russia.

Fifth—Formation of a proletarian united front in every country and in every international.

The foregoing declaration was a compromise or truce proposed after three days of inter-party bickering by the second and one-half international, so-called, and represents mediation of the conference to prevent a threatened disruption of the conference. It received the support of the second international, which, according to the Vorwärts, declared that "this joint declaration contains essential conditions which could be temporarily allowed for the sake of peace, and provided the opportunity which was required to formulate an independent declaration of reservation."

Radek Predicts Change of Policy.

Karl Radek, for the Third International, declared that "this party had decided not to oppose the joint declaration, and the feeble effort for a united front compelled therein, in the first conviction that the presence of events will compel the proletarian masses to take up the battle and teach the masses to force their reformist leaders to change their policy if they wish to avoid being swept away by the proletariat."

The Communist International will also submit a formal statement setting forth its attitude on the issues on which the present conference is unable to unite, to the executive committee of nine appointed by the Conference to investigate the prospects of holding a World Conference, the question of a plebiscite in Genoa, and other controversial issues which came up in the course of the three days' debate, have been referred to the committee of organization, comprising three members of each international.

The Conference imposed no conditions on the Bolsheviks, leaving to the newly appointed committee of nine the adjustment of all points in dispute connected with its investigation and the feasibility of international action. The action regarding Moscow's attitude on trade unions is expected to be announced in the prospective statement from the Communist International.

The reservations presented at the Conference by the Second International expressed conviction that the World Conference can only be productive of useful results if the Third International abandons its attempts to distinguish labor unions and makes an unequivocal declaration in favor of the right of self-determination and further respects the liberty of minorities holding other opinions.

WRONG FOR FRANCE TO LEAVE GENOA IS M. POINCARÉ'S BELIEF

In Answer to Strong Opposition Premier Refuses to Abandon Conference—Cancellation of Treaty Demanded.

Paris, April 23.—Pressed on all sides, but apparently resolved not to abandon Genoa and so sacrifice French interests, Raymond Poincaré, the French Premier, is taking refuge in the thick of procedure. There is considerable and, indeed, increasing discontent at the absurd punishment inflicted on Germany, which denies her participation in the general Russian negotiations now that she has concluded her own, but which puts her under no other disability. In political circles, this is felt to be entirely an insufficient sanction and Mr. Lloyd George's desire that the incident should be regarded as closed is not appreciated in France.

Nothing less than complete cancellation of the treaty will persuade parliamentary circles that Mr. Poincaré has acted with fitting vigor and Louis Buisson, who has not displayed noticeable weakness in remaining at Genoa. Against this simple unreasoning indignation, Mr. Poincaré endeavors to oppose the prudent diplomatic considerations, believing it to be fatal for France in the present circumstances to isolate herself by retiring from Genoa. Therefore he invokes the methods which, strong enough in appearance, can only lead to prolonged discussions without really interfering with the course of events at the conference.

Annulment Insisted On. The Premier has sent a demand to French representatives in various capitals calling upon them to insist on annulment of the treaty. They are to approach the governments in the capitals of the Allies and the Little Entente. It will be observed that this procedure does not tend to raise the question directly at Genoa itself. It is likely to be a gesture and no more.

An ingenious explanation, which demonstrates the subtlety of Mr. Poincaré's legal power, is indeed discovered for not bringing the matter up at Genoa. The French object to the treaty because it violates Article CXXIX of the Versailles treaty. But the question arises how can this point be made at Genoa without discussing the existing peace treaty? And has not France already ruled out existing peace treaties from the agenda? Obviously it is possible to make some play with the inconveniences, and, indeed, the dangers, of introducing the Versailles treaty, even in this manner.

It does not follow that the Premier, on reflection, appears to be to place his objections formally before the various bureaucratic bodies, including the Council of Ambassadors, which meets in Paris.

Movements of Troops. The Reparations Commission has already decided to examine the Russo-German treaty, with a view of ascertaining whether it constitutes a breach of the Versailles treaty. It has decided to ask for an official copy of the Rapallo treaty, but with a remarkable show of activity it has also resolved to consider immediately, without waiting for an official copy, the effect of the treaty on the commission's program.

Everything points to the possibility of steps being taken outside the conference, altogether independent of the commission's program. It does not follow that because the conference practically passes over the action taken at Rapallo, without exercising any severity, that much more will not be heard of the incident and its repercussions in the near future. Franco-German relations have been strained. There can be no question of mutual confidence for a long time. The Genoa challenge will be remembered when the reparations default is considered. Already there are grave hints.

CHARGED WITH MURDER OF INFANT FEMALE

According to the girl's alleged confession, she gave birth to the female child on or about January 8. Two days later she threw the body into Lac Des Sources, which is about five miles from Gracefield.

The formal charge of murder was sworn to this morning and the accused will be formally arraigned before Magistrate Roland Miller in Hull, this afternoon.
