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PENSION BILL IS AGREED

Teachers Must Teach five Years in Order to Qualify

BUREAU OF LABOR Mr. Hatheway Explains So Men Will Work for Strikes and Lockouts

Fredericton, March 14—In the house this morning, the pension bill was moved along a stage.
