William H. Morgan.

The many friends of Conductor Wm. H. Morgan and family were grieved yesterday morning to hear of his death, which took place at his home, 387 Main street, after a brief illness. Mr. Morgan was well known not only in the city but to the traveling public on the I. C. R. as well, as he had been a popular official on that road for thirty-five years. He was employed for a little more than a year as brakeman, and for the remaining time as conductor. GREAT FLOW OF WATER WAS FOUND

Extensive Operations of the Edward Partington Pulp and Paper Company at Union Point.
With the two deeds of transfer of property in Lancoster to the Edward Partington Pulp and Paper Company recorded recently, that company has practically secured the whole of Union Point. The company has exercised their option on lots leased to them by the city in terms of which they now become owners of the land on consideration of the payment of \$9,000 per lot.

The other transfer was made by Hon. Wm. Puzley and consisted of a considerable section of land owned by George S. Cushing, including the house at present occupied by Mrs. Cushing, the whole being known as the West Head Eddy land. The property thus acquired will be utilized in connection with the big paper mill which will be built on the point by the Partington people.

The plans for the new paper mill have not yet been received from England but it is expected that they will be soon and that construction work will be started as soon as possible afterwards. Operations are being carried out in boring an artesian well on the property of the paper company. It is said that the well they are boring has now been driven to a depth of 150 feet and that a flow of water has been obtained so great as to choke up the pipe, and in consequence operations have been suspended waiting the receipt of suction pumps from the States.

SOME OROMOCTO LUMBER DRIVES ARE HUNG UP

Blissville, N. B., June 5—(Special)—The light rain fall and consequent low water have effectively handicapped the lumber operations on the Oromocto. All attempts getting out the remainder of the cut for the summer work is now shattered.

The Oromocto Lumber Company's drive on the North Branch, for the swing of which the erection of a special mill was planned, has been abandoned. The Patrick drive, which is under the control of this company, has been hung up on the South Branch.

Later B. Smith has been unable to get a drive of three million feet of lumber in part to Mr. Smith, has been driven from the South Oromocto lake by safety waters. Owing to the expansion of a large crew of seventy or eighty men, the drive is now in seven days on the back track under the same management. The American company, operating on the back track belonging to the Oromocto Lumber Co., will move their mill to the property at once. It is the practice of the company to get the log down to the mill, est. by rail to the United States, where the process of manufacture is completed.
