bring judgment upon him after the feast of the Passover (translated) Easter in our Bibles).

This walting-time was one of utmost importance to Peter. The assembly of saints (here translated as 'the Church') made instant, and earnest prayer to God for him. Two very important points will be

seen here-

First,—The prayer was earnest, without ceasing: it was real, heartfelt prayer; very different to the mere repetition of words from a book, or from the lips of another, which such numbers of worldlyminded souls are content with, and who are not alive in Christ at all, but dead in trespasses and sins, and who by thus giving a sort of religious sop their consciences, vainly consider that they are doing that which is pleasing to God. Let such read Proverbs xxi. 27, and xxviii. 9, and mark what God thinks of such prayers, "Be not deceived; God is not mocked: for whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap" (Galatians vi. 7): and if he sows the wind, he will reap the whirlwind of his destruction (Hosea viii. 7). What multitudes there are who every Lord's day satisfy their consciences by going formally through various forms of service, under the idea that they are thus worshipping God, not knowing that real worship is praise offered to God for being brought out of darkness, bondage, and death, into light, liberty, and life everlasting, through Christ; and not also knowing that it is only those who are true believers in Christ and have access to God by the blood, as Abel had (Genesis iv. 4), that are accepted by God as worshippers at all; if we have not a living faith, the faith that worketh by love (Galatians v. 6), we have no access or title to go into God's presence as His worshipping children (see Romans v. 1, 2, and Ephesians ii. 18). Such are only doing what Cain did, going to offer an offering to God without the blood of reconciliation thus really without the real acknowledgment that

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
