Woodstock in Mourning—Business Will Be Suspended.

Woodstock, May 6.—Final arrangements for the funeral of the late Hon. James Sutherland were completed yesterday afternoon. The remains will lie in state at "Altadore," the home of the late Minister, from 10 to 1 o'clock. The funeral services will commence at 2.30, when Rev. Dr. McMullen will conduct the exercises. Interment will take place in the Presbyterian cemetery, the cortege leaving the house at 3 o'clock.

All the public buildings are draped, and evidences of general sorrow prevail. All factories, business houses and offices are being closed from 2 to 4 this afternoon.

The honorary pall-bearers are: Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Sir William Mulock, Hon. Charles S. Hyman, Hon. William Patterson, Hon. L. P. Brodeur, Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, Hon. Wallace Nesbitt and E. W. Evans, of Ottawa. The active bearers are: A. J. McIntosh, A. S. Ball, E. W. Nesbitt, H. J. Finkle, James Munro, M. P. F. Malcolm Douglas, George Eden and D. A. McLay.

Last evening many arrived in Woodstock to attend the funeral. A special train will arrive via the C. P. R. this forenoon at 10 o'clock, conveying the Ottawa contingent of members and friends of the deceased. There will be a special train from Toronto conveying members of the Oddfellows.

TO CHECK

SAN JOSE SCALE.

An extensive series of spraying experiments with power sprayers are being conducted in the Niagara district with a view of checking the San Jose scale on all fruit trees and the black rot in grapes. Prof. Lochead, of the Agricultural College, is in charge of this experiment.

The report of the inspection made in the townships of the southern part of Kent County shows the scale is very extensive and is now over a large area, south of Chatham to the lake. The farmers of that section are turning their attention from fruit to bean growing, and consequently are doing little or nothing to check the scale, whereas in the Niagara district the fruit growers seem to have become thoroughly aroused to the necessity of spraying, and are now working vigorously to save their orchards.
