COOK WHILE YOU SLEEP

Pireless Stoves the Latest Wrinkle In German Households At No Great Expense or Labor. Fireless cookstoves are the lates

Fireless cookstoves are the latest winkles in German households. They save worry, work and fuel, and will never scorch the food. They never blacken the pots, do away with all objectionable odors, are the ideal adjuncts to the picale or excursion culsine and for the nursery are declared by experts to be indispensable. These are only a few of the advantages claimed for the fireless stoves, or 'hay boxes,' as they are called in Germany. There is no great expense or labor involved in making the "hay boxes," for they are merely air tight chests lined with felt er paper and packed with hay er straw. The close fitting lid is covered with a pillow or cushion of some sort, to exclude the air. An old trunk, or even a large vallse, may be pressed into service for a "hay box." The process of using is even simpler than that of construction. Start, your vegetables or meats to cooking in the ordinary way over a fire and then transfer the pot containing the food to the box, being carefulthat the lid of the cooking utensil is not removed while the change is being made.

not removed while the change is being amply sufficient for vegetables, while reasted meats require twenty to thirty minutes. Most articles should remain tightly closed in the box for two or three hours, though they can be left there to keep hot for ten or twelve hours if necessary. Rice, dried beans, lentils, dried fruit, etc., should first be well soaked in cold water. After being allowed to boil for from two to five minutes, one or two hours in the box will prepare them thoroughly for the table.

"Cauliflower and other soft vegetables should merely be brought to a boil and then placed for an hour or two in the box. By the old method of cooking it is necessary to boil dried beans twe and one-half to three hours. When the 'hay box' is used, boiling for five minutes will be found sufficient. This will give a clear idea of the amount of fuel saved."

The "hay box" is a great boon to working men and women who cannot spare much time at their hemes to prepare their meals. They can set their food to cooking in the fireless stoves, go about their avocations and return whenever they please to find an appetizing meal awaiting them.

A Prehistoric Cave Dwelling

A Prehistoric Cave Dwelling.

A prehistoric cave dwelling has recently been discovered near Winsnau on Lake Lucerne, in Switzerland. The entrance to this cavern has been blocked for ages by the accumulation of falling rocks and earth. Its existence being known, a party of antiquarians had the entrance passage into the cavern cleared of obstructions, and a grotto or series of caves, dating to the Stone period, was laid bare. A fine collection of stone implements, including knives, axe-heads and spears, gigantic shells rudely ornamented, evidently drinking vessels, and dishes was discovered. In one chamber of the cavern the explorers found the remains of the bones of many extinct animals; while one section of the cave, which is believed to have been the dwelling of an important family in the Stone age, had evidently served as a workshop for the stonecutters, for here were found many stones in the process of being shaped into implements.
