Toronto Live Stock.

Trade generally was fairly good at the Toronto Cattle Market this morning, the run of cattle was somewhat heavier and for good stock the demand was rather prisker. There was a better feeling generally in all lines, but prices are showing little or no change. The total run offering amounted to 76 cars, including 945 cattle, 1,223 sheep and lambs, 1,692 hogs and 35 calves.

Export Cattle—The run of good cattle was light, too large a percentage of the offerings being unfinished grass cattle. There was a good demand for the best cattle on the market, and their prices kept, well up to those of the pravious day's market. Some space had to be filled, and this accounted for the better demand for cattle. The best cattle on the market sold at \$5.15, the extra choice lots running from that figure down to \$5 per cwt. The general run of choice cattle sold at \$4.70 to \$4.90, and medium were about steady at \$4.30 to \$4.60.
