### HIS WILL FILED.

Late Senator Wood Left Over \$700,000.

Hamilton, June 19.—The will of the late Senator A. T. Wood of this city was filed for probate in the Surrogate Court yesterday by Messrs. Washington & Beasley. The document is dated July 3, 1889, and is witnessed by Hon. J. M. Gibson and Mr. T. W. Cook, Mrs. A. T. Wood, her son, Mr. William A. Wood, and Mr. George Vallance, all of whom are trustees of the estate. The will is in full force and effect. The estate is valued at \$700,000. It is given in the following summary—Ontario property, \$35,000; life insurance, \$12,000; securities for money, \$20,000; debts, etc., \$170,500; bank and other stocks, \$28,000; household goods and furniture, \$5,000; total, \$360,500. The will directs that the estate be divided into four equal parts, one for each of the four daughters, Mrs. Wm. A. Wood, Mrs. George Vallance, Mrs. J. M. Gibson, and Mrs. T. W. Cook. Each daughter is to receive one-fourth of the estate, and the trustees are to have the power to sell or lease any part of the estate for the benefit of the daughters.
