The above course of Clinical instruction does not form a necessary part the curriculum, but has been established to allow the student facilities acquiring practical knowledge of disease, when his time is not of ere occupied in attendance upon lectures.

LIBRARY AND MUSEUM.

The Library contains upwards of 4,000 volumes, including the most ful books of reference, as well as the most elementary ones: the works of older authors as well as the most recent. It is open to the Students hout charge, under necessary regulations for the care of the books. The seum contains a large number of preparations, chieffy Pathological; wax and papier-maché models.

HOSPITALS.

he Montreal General Hospital is visited every day by the attending medificers, most of whom are Professors of the University. In addition to the por patients a large number of out-door patients, including a considerable ortion of children, are treated before the student and will afford materials be special course of clinical instruction to be given this year.
