Friday, April 11, 1913 DISGUSTING The above is the only word which can be applied to the gross language of the Toronto Globe, with reference to Premier Borden and the incident of the closure.

Rev. Mr. Macdonald, the editor is at the Capital, and here are some extracts of the stuff he is writing his sheet. "No incident in the recollection of the oldest Parliamentarians has aroused anything like the general indignation which has greeted the story of the cowardly conduct of Canada's Prime Minister to his invariably chivalrous opponent a distinguished predecessor. Many Conservatives themselves are privately expressing regret and disapproval and seeking to excuse themselves from participation in the responsibility. No hand ever scourged Premier Borden so ruthlessly as has his own."

"The real mastership of Canada Government was declared from the housetops on Wednesday. What was deliberately designed by the Government caucus to be a humiliation of Sir Wilfrid Laurier proved to the world the deep degradation of Premier Borden. With suddenness swift as Lucifer from heaven Mr. Borden was hurled from the high pedestal of his own loud protestations of a statesman's honor down into the common run of knavish political trickstering. The man who did it was his own lieutenant, whom he dare not trust but whom he has not the power to resist. Robert Rogers, not Robert Borden, is master of Canada's Government."

And Macdonald actually had the consummate audacity to sign his name to such arrant and indecent buffoonery. He is even a worse nuisance a menace to Canada than are the militant suffragettes in the Old Land. The gist of the whole thing is that the obstructionists found themselves obstructed, and it is the opinion of all decent thinking men, that it served them jolly well right. The only possible criticism is that the move might have been made sooner.

A SANE VIEW OF THE SITUATION. The following is an editorial appearing in the Hamilton Herald (Independent):

"The Borden Government has got its closure rule before the House at last-not without trouble. Mr. Borden introduced the closure resolution in a speech which was conciliatory in spirit and dignified in tone. He regretted the necessity of amending the rules of debate in order to cope with systematic obstruction, but the necessity existed, and must be dealt with. He claimed that the proposed closure rules were not so drastic as those which have long been in force in the British House of Commons. Sir Wilfrid Laurier proposed rules were more drastic than the British rules. Promptly the Premier retorted by offering to substitute the British rules for those which he proposed if Sir Wilfrid were willing; but the Opposition leader evidently prepared for this. When Sir Wilfrid rose to reply to the Premier it was his intention to offer an amendment to the Government resolution. This he admitted afterwards. But the Government had foreseen the effect of this and had evidently prepared for it. If Sir Wilfrid's amendment had been moved, it would have opened the way to an endless succession of amendments, and thus the Opposition tacticians could have successfully obstructed the effort of the Government to get the closure resolution voted on and brought into force. It was necessary, from the Government's point of view, to prevent the introduction of Sir Wilfrid's amendment. This was done by the use of a rule which Sir Wilfrid himself had introduced some years ago, but which has never been brought into play until yesterday. The rule provides that when two members rise together to address the chair, the House may determine by vote which of the two shall be heard."

"When Mr. Borden had finished speaking, Sir Wilfrid and Mr. Hazen, Minister of Marine, rose to their feet together. The speaker recognized Sir Wilfrid. But Mr. Northrup of East Hastings, resorting to rule 17, moved that Mr. Hazen be heard. There was nothing in the motion, and of course it was carried. Sir Wilfrid had to take his seat, and Mr. Hazen
