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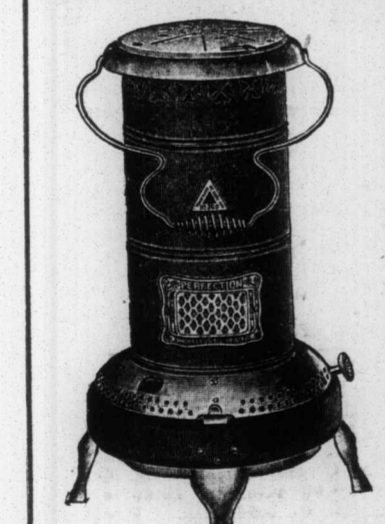

REVOLUTION IN GERMANY?

Serious Uprisings Reported in Berlin; Country May Be Swept by Revolt

COUNTRY ISOLATED

Holland Believes Serious Disturbances are Occurring London, March 22.—Reuter's Amsterdam correspondent reports it is rumored that serious riots have broken out in Berlin in connection with the scarcity of food.

"A despatch from Oostzaal, Holland, says persistent rumors are current of great rioting in Berlin," the despatch says. "Frontier regiments are reported to have left for Berlin to maintain order."

Country is Isolated There has been a curious absence of private letters from Berlin and Hamburg during the past few days. Newspapers here are taking a serious view of the rumors. Correspondents have gone to the frontier to endeavor to get information of what is proceeding. It may be that one of the many hunger strikes on perhaps a larger scale than ever before is in progress, but from all available information it would seem by no means likely that any revolt in Berlin would have any chance of success among the old men, who alone remain as civilians. Nevertheless, after what the German army and people have gone through during the two years it must not entirely be ruled out as impossible that part of the army, at least might join with the munition workers. At the moment of telegraphing the latest tidings from the frontier are such as to suggest things are indeed grave, though no details are given. It is noteworthy that only two days ago an official announcement was made throughout Germany of the raising by 20 per cent. of the price of potatoes and other food-stuffs, including rye and wheat.
