

**SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS**

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, who was at the commencement of the present war, and has since continued to be a British subject, may homestead an alloted or neutral tract of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for District. Entry by proxy may be made on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon certain conditions. A settler after obtaining homestead patent, if he cannot secure a pre-emption, may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$300 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$200.

Holders of entries may count time of employment as farm labourers in Canada during war. Duties under certain conditions. When Dominion Lands are advertised or posted for entry, returned soldiers who have served overseas and have been honourably discharged, receive one day priority in applying for entry at local Agents' Office (but not Sub-Agency). Discharge papers must be presented to Agent. Deputy Minister of the Interior. No unauthorized publication of this advertisement will be paid for.

## ANARCHY'S APOSTLES

Emma Goldman and Alexander Berkman in Jail in United States

It is no new experience for Emma Goldman and Alexander Berkman to languish in jail, and apparently not particularly distasteful to them. What would be unappreciable would be to be sent to jail privately, without any newspaper comment, without their friends being given a chance to hail them as martyrs. At present they are waiting trial on a charge of using their influence to defeat the operation of the selective draft law. Berkman is to defend himself, so he is unlikely to get anything worse than life imprisonment. He will probably defend Miss Goldman. The future is indeed dark for both of them. It has been half-jocularly suggested that it was rather a mistake to arrest them, since under the present law, and if left at large it would have been much easier for the New York police to round up the other professed anarchists and pacifists who are always to be found in their company. Dejected of their natural leaders, there may continue to be some underground work, but it will be more difficult to capture.

Most thoroughly detested woman. Emma Goldman is a Russian Jewess, and was born in 1869. At the age of 17 she was a full-fledged anarchist, and arrived in the United States ready to preach the doctrine she had learned from the Nihilists. For a while she worked in factories; then she met and was unhappy, but the natural ecstasy of her husband is taken for granted. She concluded that marriage is a failure as a result of her own failure since then she has formed occasional unconventional alliances. At present she is residing with Berkman. In 1893 she incited a riot in New York, and as a result spent a year in jail. This did not cure her, for on her release she resumed her anarchist preachings, though with more cunning. At the time of the assassination of President McKinley she was arrested on suspicion of having incited Czolgoz, who was a friend of hers, but was acquitted. Her life has been a failure since she is probably the most thoroughly detested woman in the United States. For a considerable time she found it expedient to pass as "Miss Smith" because of her difficulty in getting lodging.

Tried to Murder Frick. Berkman is her favorite pupil. He is a nation-wide notoriety when he made a speech in New York under H. C. Frick of Pittsburgh. Early broodings over capitalism and the injustice of all existing forms of government are said to have driven him to the deed which earned for him a prison sentence at 22 years. He served only 14 years. Like Emma Goldman, imprisonment did not haunt his days and on his release he immediately took up his work where it had been broken off and began the publishing of a revolutionary labor paper, Miss Goldman, too, by the way, is a published writer. Since then, Berkman has been several times under arrest, but has not been sentenced, though several of his times have served time because they endeavored to put his ideas into practice. He has been associated with the I. W. W., and indeed he and Miss Goldman have found the scheme of becoming patrons of new forms of violence, in causes which interest them only because of the opportunities for violence that they present, to be a better means of achieving notoriety than steadily preaching their old doctrine of anarchy.

The Anarchist's Creed. The creed of Goldman and Berkman has been frequently declared in their writings. As to government, they believe that there ought to be no government at all. They contend that it has only succeeded in protecting property and monopoly, and as they declare that all property ought to be in common and nobody has any private rights to it, they insist that government is a huge failure, and the cause of many of the troubles of the world. They maintain that soldiers are merely professional man-killers, who are worse than ordinary murderers, since the murderer kills either for some advantage to himself or in a fit of anger. In the course of their speeches against the draft, they said over and over again, "I believe that military war will cease when the liberty loving spirits of the world say to their masters, 'Go and do your own killing. We have sacrificed our lives and loved ones in a long enough fighting your battles; if you return you have made parasites and criminals of us in time of peace, and bring to us the time of war. You have separated us from our brothers and have made the world a human slaughter house. No, we will not fight this war. We will stay in the country you have stolen from us.'"

Believe in the Bomb. They believe in free speech, that is, the right to say or write exactly what he thinks, without any restriction whatever. If any harm should result from this freedom, it will be counteracted by more free speech. All forms of religion they hold to be superstition, and all churches stumbling blocks to human progress. They believe in free love, free motherhood. The most pernicious part of the doctrine is that they have a right to impose their beliefs upon peopleman's feet.

## PIONEER SOCIETY

Anecdotes of the early days of Confederation and the pioneer times which preceded the passing of the British North America Act were well told in the paper on "Pioneer Days of Peel County," which was read yesterday afternoon by Mr. Fred C. Jarvis, before a large gathering of members of the York Pioneer and Historical Society in the theatre of the Normal School on Gould St., Toronto. In the absence of Dr. James L. Hughes, the president of the association, who is away on his annual lecturing tour, the chair was taken by Mr. E. Galley, secretary.

Mr. Jarvis described the difficulties which beset the early immigrant to Canada, and told how, after a six weeks' ocean voyage their first concern was to troll for food off the coast of Newfoundland. He outlined the tedious journey of those days, from seaboard to settlement, when for instance the trip from Quebec to Montreal occupied two days and one night of travel in a rude coach drawn by six horses over rough roads. The trip even from York to Hamilton was an adventurous journey in those days—that was when Toronto boasted only 6,000 inhabitants and fur traders and Indians still bartered at the port, which because of the nature of its commerce came to be known as Port Credit. "Butter was considered high at fifteen cents per pound in those days," Mr. Jarvis added.

PRESS MUZZLED TO SUPPRESS TRUTH  
Ban Again Placed by Germany Upon Max Harden Outspoken Paper  
PEACE DISCUSSION  
Writer Approved Terms Entente as Tending To Universal Peace

Amsterdam, July 7.—Die Zukunft of Berlin, Maximilian Harden's publication, which has again been suppressed informed its subscribers that the action was taken in consequence of its issue of June 30. This number criticized the Norddeutsche Allgemeine Zeitung's statement of the Grimm-Hoffmann affair which resulted in the resignation of Dr. Hoffmann as a Swiss Federal councillor and the expulsion of Robert Grimm, the Swiss international Socialist, from Russia after the exposure of the recent abortive peace manoeuvre. Die Zukunft printed the news of the humanitarian nose and said early peace was only possible by Germany crushing her enemies or joining her efforts to those of the majority in the world.

"It is only this second miracle that is obtainable by human strength," Die Zukunft said, "the strength of the German people, an arbitrary government; an arbitration court to decide who is guilty of starting the war, a bond of nations to carry out the court's decision; and the creation of a situation which would remove the decision of peace or war from the will of one mortal and place it in the hands of the community."

"If," continues Die Zukunft, "Germany sees celestial signs flying over these aims then peace is obtainable to-morrow, but if not, a situation for which millions of people have yearned appears ignominious to her, she must continue to fight until one group conquers and the other is 'killed down.'"

## EMPRESS OF AUSTRIA PRO-ALLY

Seeking To Induce Husband To Severe Alliance With Germany

London, July 7.—According to The Daily Express, a personal friend of the Empress Zita of Austria has informed certain members of the House of Commons that the empress is exerting herself strongly in the interests of France. She is credited with sufficient influence over Emperor Charles to induce him to try to withdraw from the Austro-Hungarian alliance with Germany as soon as Austria-Hungary is enabled to take such action.
