SALISBURY MADE ONE GAIN IN YESTERDAY'S ENGLISH ELECTIONS.

A Pro-Boer Candidate Goes Down to Defeat.

London, Friday, Oct. 12, 8 a. m.—In the pollings in the parliamentary general election yesterday the ministerialists gained two seats, making their total gains as 30 as against 29 for the opposition. In Sutherlandshire M. F. S. Leveson-Gower, Liberal-Unionist, defeated Mr. John McLeod, Liberal, who held the seat in the late parliament, and in the Southport Division of Southwest Lancashire, Mr. Marshall Hall, Con., wrested the seat from Sir Geo. Augustus Pilkington, who secured it in the by-election last year.

The constitution of the new House thus far is as follows:—
Ministerialists 374
Opposition 224
As yet there has been no ministerialist gains in Wales and no Liberal gains in Scotland.

The list of the re-elected includes the nephew and heir of the late Earl of Beaconsfield, Mr. Ralph D'Israeli, who has represented the Atrincham Division of Cheshire in the Conservative interest since 1892.

PRO-BOER DEFEATED.
Dr. Gavin-Brown Clark, the former consul-general of the South African Republic and a noted pro-Boer, Liberal, was badly beaten in Caithness-shire, the Liberal Imperialist candidate, R. L. Harmsworth, winning the seat.

DILKE GETS THERE.
Sir Charles Dilke easily retained his seat for the Forest of Dean.

A FLAT CONTRADICTION.
Officials of the Foreign Office here informed a press representative that there is absolutely no foundation for the report in circulation here that Viscount Cromer had been summoned to Egypt to take a seat in the new Cabinet.

THE FRENCH FEAR CHAMBERLAIN.
Paris, Oct. 11.—The British general election is exciting a good deal of interest and comment in continental Europe. The opinion is universal that it is a personal triumph for Chamberlain, and that if he becomes predominant in the British government an era of aggression and jingoism will be inaugurated, which will seriously threaten the peace of Europe. In France especially are sober men anxious. It is felt that if in future difficulties arising out of Newfoundlands, Siam, Africa, etc., the negotiations are in the hands of Chamberlain war may easily be provoked, especially as Chamberlain is likely, as in the case of the Transvaal, to refuse all compromise, and to offer to settle on the basis of absolute surrender by the other party. After Fashoda, France

will never again back down completely, and with Chamberlain at the British helm things are likely to get to extremes. It is impossible to describe the dislike and suspicion with which Chamberlain is regarded in continental Europe. It is not an exaggeration to say that Britain with Chamberlain as Premier, would have all Europe against her, hostile and watchful. Many Transvaalers, exiled from Johannesburg and Pretoria, are arriving in Europe, and the stories they tell of British brutality and arbitrariness also add to the flame. Never before, perhaps, was Britain regarded with so much suspicion.

ENROLL AT ONCE.

The Process of Organizing and Equipping the Kent Battalion to Commence Forthwith.

As announced in yesterday's Planet, a meeting was held yesterday afternoon at the Hotel Garner to discuss the formation of the new battalion here. There were present Lieut.-Col. Holmes, London, Major Rankin, Chatham, W. R. Hickey, of Bothwell, T. K. McKean, J. S. Black, Wm. Mowbray, and D. W. B. Spry. It was decided to go ahead at once with the preparations and enrolling will commence immediately.

Lieut.-Col. Holmes said he would have the drill shed remodelled and put in shape right away and also fully equipped with arms and accoutrements.

Mont, and Rollie Patton and Mrs. Harry Northwood, of St. Laurens, P. Q., are grand children of the deceased.

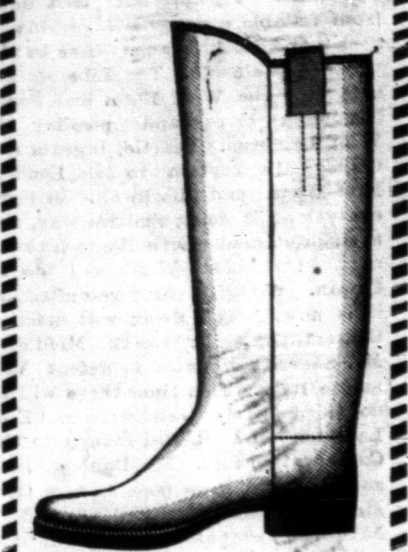
