Comments.

Ag unnecessary amount of talk is being made over the revival of an old order respecting the privacy of Rideau Park, the residence of the governor general. There is a certain dignity that appertains to the office that should be respected, and just as the occupants happen to be approachable is no reason why the general public should be permitted to prowl around the grounds, possibly with an eye open for an invitation to stay to tea.

Hon. W. T. White, the young Liberal whom R. L. Borden invited to enter his cabinet as Finance Minister, was returned on the 6th inst. in the county of Leeds, Ontario, without opposition. In making his initial bow to the electors of Leeds he said he had been opposed to reciprocity and had found R. L. Borden's whole policy acceptable. He said 'At Massey Hall, Toronto, in September I placed my name behind Mr. Borden and joined the Liberal-Conservative party. I entered the door, I did not climb up some other way.' Mr. White said that that door had been opened by Sir John Macdonald, and he drew attention to the fact that Hon. Mr. Borden, the new premier, had formerly voted Liberal and had joined the Conservative party as an opponent of Commercial Union in 1891. The mantle of Sir John has fallen on worthy shoulders—those of Hon. R. L. Borden.

The People's Forum.

To the Editors of THE ACADIAN.
MR. EDITOR.—Before you put your 'quill' on the correspondence re alcoholic prescriptions, I would like to give your readers the legal statement respecting the recording of said prescriptions. It was sent to me by a prominent attorney in Halifax:—
(The sale of intoxicating liquor for exclusively medicinal purposes may be made by any person duly authorized to sell the same, but such intoxicating liquor when sold for medicinal purposes shall be removed from the premises and such sale shall be made only on the Certificate of a medical man having no interest in the sale, affirming that such liquor has been prescribed for the person named therein. Such vendor shall file the Certificate and keep a register of all such sales indicating the name of the purchaser, and the quantity sold, and shall make an annual return of all such sales on the 31st day of December in every year to the Collector of inland Revenue within whose revenue division the County or City is situated. Any medical man who gives such a Certificate for any other than strictly medicinal purposes shall for the first offence be liable on Summary Conviction to a penalty of \$20.00 and for a second or subsequent offence shall be liable on Summary Conviction to a penalty of \$40.00.)
