COUNTY COUNCIL.
Regular December Session of Wellington's Parliament.

THURSDAY MORNING.
The council met at 10 o'clock pursuant to adjournment, the Warden presiding. All the members present, except Mr. Freeland.

DAMAGES.

Fifteen Were Killed.
JULIE, Ill., Dec. 4.—A blast furnace blew up here this afternoon, burying 15 men beneath the falling masonry and metal.

Eleven men were at work in the inside at the top and six at the top making repairs necessitated by a recent fatal explosion. The furnace fell without warning, and masonry work and furnace linings were piled up in a confused heap with the dead and dying workmen. Eight bodies were recovered.
