Ottawa, Feb. 25-W. F. O'Connor, high cost of living commissioner at Ottawa, has applied to attorney-general of New Brunswick for leave to institute criminal proceedings against the New Brunswick Potato Exchange and its members individually. The operation of the exchange in its relation to potato prices to the consumer has been attracting a good deal of attention at the capital and Mr. O'Connor's action is a result of investigation.

The price of potatoes in Canada is now almost double that in Great Britain. The imperial government has fixed the price at \$1.17 bag, but in Ottawa they are selling at \$3.
