AN EXPLANATION

There seems to be some misapprehension on the part of a few directors of public institutions as to the business methods of the Herald. It has at least come to our knowledge that these men are charging that Herald advertising rates are extortionate. A special case in connection with a public institution is quoted in which the Herald, for the same service charged more than double that the Free Press. Seeing that this story, as it is being told, is not calculated to help the Herald's business a brief explanation will be in order.

In the first place there was a mistake in this particular Herald bill, a mistake which was corrected. This we claim, is as much as the Herald could be expected to do. It is true that there still remained a difference of three dollars in the Herald and Free Press bills, but it is for the Free Press and not the Herald to explain how this came about. The chief point is that the Herald's advertising rates are published in the paper at least once a week. This schedule of charges was carefully drawn up, and is published for every one to read. The cost of an advertisement can be ascertained before it is inserted and it can be checked by this published schedule after it is inserted. We are not going to enter into a cut-price competition. We are running the Herald as a business proposition as well as we know how and there is no reason for misapprehension as there is no excuse for misrepresentation. The bill against the Hospital was charged according to our advertised rates, neither more nor less. We were not asked to make a donation of the advertisement either in whole or in part. On the other hand, for the benefit of our friends who are retelling this story, we want it understood that there was no overcharging.

NEW FRANCHISE BILL

The Liberal Press or that section of it in the control of the Liberal party machine, is raising a tremendous howl about the application of the closure to the new franchise bill. It is all according to rote. Purely obstruction tactics were pursued in order to force the government to apply

the closure. Now the application of the closure is being used to obscure the real principles involved. First of all there would have been no new franchise bill if the politicians had not schemed for a general election. There was never any need for an election and the men responsible for it are guilty of a crime against the Dominion. Secondly, any bill, whatever defects it may have which disfranchises men of German birth and enemy sympathizers will have the support of all patriotic Canadians, no matter how it is passed through the Commons. If the Liberal press wants to align itself with the German element of the prairie provinces let it come out openly. The new Franchise Bill is not so much a vote-catcher as a vote-stopper, and as such it needs no defence. Thirdly, any provision which will tend to give full effect to the vote of the men in the firing line is entitled to support and will get it. After all, the real opposition to this temporary franchise measure comes from the men of German and Austrian birth whom it deprives of their vote.

Balfour Guthrie & Co. have been appointed chartering agents for the Commonwealth of Australia and announce that they are ready to entertain offers for tonnage, both steam and sail, to load at Australian ports for practically any port on the west coast of either South or North America.

The Northern Mills and Timber Company Limited, is the name of a new company which has just been incorporated under the Companies Act of British Columbia. The head office will be at Vancouver and the capital is \$20,000, divided into two hundred shares.

FURTHER LIST TAKEN BY SUNKEN STEAMER

Fresh difficulties and problems face the B. C. Salvage company's corps who have undertaken the task of raising the sunken steamer British Columbia, which sank at the Hastings Mill wharf some time ago. The vessel yesterday slipped further down the shelving bank in front of the wharf and now lies almost flat on her starboard side on the bottom. The steamer's masts which held her against the wharf, broke off and allowed her to list over almost flat on her side.

As there is about 40 feet of water there at high tide the vessel is completely submerged at high and just portions or rather the outline of her hull shows at low tide. In this position the vessel will be much more difficult to raise as she will first have to be righted before any further attempt is made to raise her. Work is still proceeding in the dumping of a couple of scows loads of sand and gravel outside the vessel so as to make a bank for her to rest against when she is righted. Incidentally, the dumping of this material there will mean further dredging job after the steamer is raised. It is just possible to read the vessel's name on the port bow at low tide.

GERMANS TO TRY AND CHECK HAIG

Amsterdam, Sept. 10.—The Telegraph attaches great importance to the reported visit of the German Kaiser to Brussels, and to the heavy movement of troops across Belgium. It declares that a great counter-offensive is in preparation, as it is absolutely essential to check the British advance into Belgium, which has for its objective the capture of the coast line and the destruction of the submarine bases at Zeebrugge and elsewhere.

At Ashcroft from his potato crop of last year a Chinaman cleared \$22,000. He sent most of the money to China. Part of his crop was raised on land that he rented from white men.

There will be six centres in the province at which vendors will be stationed with government authority to stock and sell liquor according to the provisions of the B. C. Prohibition Act. The suggested centres are Victoria, Vancouver, Prince Rupert, Kamloops, Fort George and Rossland.
