Dominion Parliament.

OTTAWA, MARCH 15.

In supply, on the item of \$10,000, the amount required to bring out the screw corvette *Charybdis*, Sir Richard Cartwright asked if this was the first vote in connection with this vessel.

Sir John Macdonald said this was the first vote, and it was proposed by him to reduce it by half, and make it \$5,000. It had been decided to sail the vessel across the Atlantic, and in that way render unnecessary the employment of a large number of engineers to bring her across.

Sir Richard Cartwright asked what it was proposed to do with the vessel. Sir John Macdonald said it was to be used as a training ship or nautical school in which boys desiring to embrace the profession of the sea would be educated during a season of life.

In answer to Mr. Mills, Sir John said the vessel was not a new one, but she had sailed in the eastern sea, and had weathered most storms, and all kinds of kind of things, and would, no doubt, survive the voyage across the Atlantic. He thought the vessel would make a good training vessel, and it would be stationed in the harbor of St. John.

Sir R. Cartwright asked how many youngsters it was proposed to put on board, and what the estimated expenditure would be.

Sir John said before the Government asked Parliament for a vote on the question they would submit the bill to the House, and the estimated expenditure would be \$10,000.

OTTAWA, MARCH 16.

Mr. Quimet moved that the order for the second reading of the act to explain and further amend the Canada Temperance Act, he made the first order of the day. Mr. Blake raised the point of order that the hon. gentleman had a notice of motion to this effect. Mr. Quimet urged the importance of having this bill discussed at the present time, so that the feeling of the House might be ascertained with regard to it. He thought it would be a good thing for temperance people to have the matter settled, and to have the bill thrown out if the majority of the House were not in favor of it. He hoped the Government would set a time for the discussion of the bill.

On the item of \$7,500, for a subsidy of \$1,500 each for five voyages of steamers from P. E. Island to England and back, Sir L. Tilly said this was an experiment to some extent for a year. The vessel would not call at ports outside the Island.

OTTAWA, MARCH 18.

Sir Leonard Tilley moved the House into committee of the whole on the following resolution:

"That it is expedient to authorize the Governor-in-Council to raise by way of loan under the provisions of the Act 20 Victoria, Chapter 6, and 28 Victoria, Chapter 4, a sum of money not exceeding in the whole \$100,000, in addition to the sum now remaining unexpended and negotiable of the loans authorized by Parliament under the Act 43 Victoria, Chapter 10, Section 4."

He explained that the resolution was intended to cover the amounts which had been voted of capital and interest on this session, and for the redemption of the portion of the debt falling due during the next year.

The resolution passed through committee and was read a first and second time.

OTTAWA, MARCH 21.

Parliament was prorogued this afternoon, the Governor General reading the following Speech:

The extension of the boundaries of Manitoba will confer the privilege of local self-government on the people already residing in, or who may hereafter occupy, the area now added to the Province, and by enabling the legislative and executive authorities in its enlarged limits to tend greatly to add to the welfare of that interesting region.

The extension of the telegraphic system by cable to the Gulf of St. Lawrence will aid the fishery and the commerce of Canada and increase the safety of its waters.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

In Her Majesty's name I thank you for the supplies you have so readily granted, and for the assistance you have so kindly rendered in the condition of the revenue.
