13,000 TROOPS FOR MOROCCO.

French Cabinet Has Finally Approved the
Increase.

Paris, March 3.—The Cabinet has final-
ly approved an increase of troops in
Morocco, and the giving of Gen. D'Amade
of the command of 13,000 men. They
will be employed simultaneously,
but Gen. D'Amade is such a hatter that
the Government fears he is wearing out
his present force, which will now be given
a rest. Gen. Lyautey will accompany
M. Regnault, the French minister at
Tangier, to the coast towns to study the
policy question and report thereon to
the Government.

LARGER SHIPS NEXT YEAR.

Vessels 1,000 Feet Long and of Proportion-
ate Depth.

Belfast, March 3.—Harland & Wolff
have begun the construction of ship-
yards that will allow the building of
ships larger than any yet known; that
is to say, vessels 1,000 feet long and of
proportionate beam and depth. It is ex-
pected that a mammoth White Star
liner will be laid down here about a
year from now, and this vessel will mark
an epoch in the world's history of ship-
building and engineering.

75,000 STARVED TO DEATH.

One Result of German Campaign in East
Africa.

Berlin, March 3.—Apart from the
losses sustained in fighting and by dis-
ease, the recent German campaign in
East Africa caused the deaths of 75,000
natives from starvation. This statement
was made by Colonial Secretary Den-
burg in the course of the debate on the
colonial budget in the Reichstag. He
explained that the troops were compelled
to seize all supplies, either for food or
soldiers or weaken the enemy, with the
result that 75,000 natives starved to
death.

CHICAGO WANTS A TOMB.

Will Endeavor to Secure an Ancient One
From Egypt.

London, March 3.—Despatches from
Assuan state that negotiations have
been begun there by the representative
of a Chicago museum for the trans-
ference to Chicago of an ancient tomb
weighing 250 tons. The tomb is situated
near the Pyramid of Sakkarah,
twenty miles from Cairo, and a favorite
rest of tourists. The Chicago museum
authorities wish to remove the tomb in
its entirety. The most difficult part
of the task will be the removal of the
tomb, which is divided into sections
from the desert to the nearest point on
the railway.

PEOPLE ROBBED OF \$700,000.

Startling Charge Against Mail-Carrying
Railroads in United States.

Washington, March 3.—The startling
charge that the railroads of the country
carrying mails had robbed the people out
of \$700,000,000 was made in the House
of Representatives by Mr. Lloyd, of Mis-
souri, to-day. He declared that the new
system of weighing mails was an admis-
sion of the Postmaster-General that the
weighing in the past twenty-seven years
had been fraudulent. He called for an
investigation of the Post Office Depart-
ment, and Mr. Wanger, of Pennsylvania,
Chairman of the committee to control
the expenditures of that department,
promised that an inquiry would be con-
ducted.

KILLED BY INDELIBLE PENCIL.

Girl in Laundry Poisoned by Putting
Crayon in Her Mouth.

New York, March 3.—The Herald has
received the following despatch from
Wilkesbarre, Pa.: Poisoned by placing
an indelible pencil in her mouth, Miss
Mary L. Sales, of Plains, near here, died
to-day after three weeks of suffering.
She was a clerk in a laundry in this
city; and it was her duty to mark ar-
ticles as they were received. She did
this with an indelible pencil, which she
mistakenly with her tongue hundreds of
times during the day. This caused the
poisoning three weeks ago, and she gradu-
ally succumbed to it.
