PEARL GORDON AT 5 TO 2.

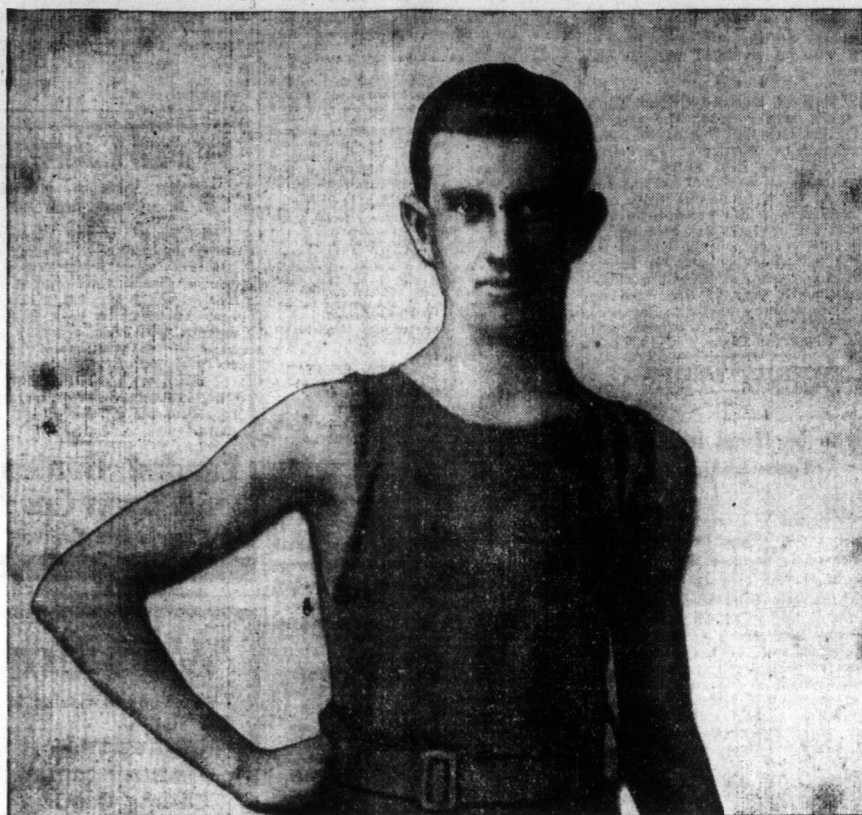

How Pari-Mutuels Will Kill Hand Books.

Lexington, Ky., May 12.—The reintroduction of the pari-mutuel betting machines at Louisville on the opening of the New Louisville Jockey Club's meeting last week met with such popular favor that it is beginning to look as if the days of the bookmaker in Kentucky are numbered. There is no condition, political or otherwise, that will make the use of the machines and the sale of auction pools imperative at Louisville, but there is an intimation from certain of the proprietors that they will be in operation there, particularly if they prove more lucrative to the Louisville Jockey Club than were the books in previous years.

There is, too, better than an outside chance that the State Racing Commission will indicate its pleasure in the matter. Since the recent meeting here certain members of the commission have announced the intention of placing the ban on the dollar book, and now the Court of Appeals has upheld the constitutionality of the law providing for the operation of pari-mutuel machines on race tracks during the progress of the race meeting. It would not be at all surprising if the State Racing Commission comes forth with a rule forbidding any other form of betting.

In time pari-mutuels would prove a means to the wiping out of handbooks. The explanation is simple. Say, for instance, you own a horse which is reasonably certain to win a race on a given date. You want to wager say \$10,000 on his chances. You place your money in the hands of agents in cities where handbooks are numerous and they take it with the understanding that they are to pay the mutual price as officially reported. Say the mutuals pay \$15, that is 3 to 1. Had you wagered that \$10,000 on the machines at the track the chances are that you would have won, as he rightfully should, have been odds-on.

The handbook man will not stand for many such bets. He will soon realize that the percentage is against him. He will offer shorter prices. You will not take them. He will suspend his operations and you will bet your money at the track, where it should be wagered; where the association will get the benefit of the commission and where the public will save the odds you are really entitled to. When the handbooks are gone the family of the factory worker, the teamster, the salesman and the clerk will have more to eat and more to wear.

"Shirtwaist Ball" is the Latest.

You've heard about the knuckle ball, Mathewson's fade away ball, the rise ball, the splitter, the curve and endless others, but the versatile twirler have added still another to the list. The latter discovery is the "shirtwaist ball," for the garment generally termed "shirtwaist" does not figure in the delivery. They call it that just to give it a fancy title. It is now used exclusively on the south side grounds at Chicago, but Detroit pitcher, Eddie Saver, especially, figure on making it in Detroit, with that new twirler in right centre as an aid.

The shirt ball is really only a fast one, shoulder high, in Chicago. It is used only on hot days, for it is then that all the fans in the bleachers in centre field take off their coats. When they do this there is a straight white line parallel with the shoulder of the pitcher and the batsman's eyes. When the ball shoots towards him he cannot see it because of the white shirts.

"The ball is generally recognized around the circuit," says Saver. "All the Chicago twirlers use it and it helps them win many a game. Write you the odds you are really entitled to.
