Copies of the agreement have been given to the members of the Board of Works and the matter will be settled by that body at its next meeting. The aldermen think it has dragged along enough, and that it is up to the Council now to dispose of it. The scheme is for the Radial to build the new track on Sanford aveto build the new track on Sanford avenue and also on Wentworth street, under the same conditions as the track on Sanford avenue from King to Wilson street was built, the Radial companies to have running rights, if the city should take over the road at the end of the franchise. The company will also agree that no Dundas or Brantford cars shall be run east of the Terminal Station except empty cars to go to the car sheds. cept empty cars to go to the car sheds. The tracks will not be used for freight.

GOMPER'S CASE.

Appeal Verdict on "We Don't Patronize" List.

Washington, March 17 .- The Court of Appeals of the District of Columbia today modified and affirmed the opinion of Justice Gould, of the Supreme Court of the district, enjoining the American Federation of Labor, Samuel Gompers and other defendants from publishing in the "We Don't Patronize" list the of the Bucks Stove & Range Com-of St. Louis.

The opinion which was handed down by Justice Robb holds that the decree of Judge Gould should be modified to the extent that there should be eliminated from the decree the restriction of the labor organization, and the other defendants from mentioning, writing or referring "to the business of the Bucks Stove Rance Co. or its customers." Otherwhich was handed down and Range Co. or its customers." Otherwise the decree is affirmed. The court holds that the combination and boycott in furtherance thereof and the publica-tion in the "We Don't Patronize" list in aid of the boycott is illegal.
