Set Forth in Mr. Joseph Martin's English Election Address.

lish Election Address.

London, April 15.—Mr. Joseph Martin, K. C., has issued an election address, in which he says he considers the question of the House of Lords the most important with which the Liberal party has to deal. The adoption of tariff reform as advocated by the Tory party would be the greatest calamity that could happen the country, with the exception of war, pestilence or famine. The policy of protection would at once dethrone the United Kingdom from its proud position as the commercial mistress of the seas, and would also bring with it a long list of evils, including extreme electoral corruption, such as now prevailed toral corruption, such as now pro in the United States and Canada.
