COUNCIL OF VALLEY CITY.

Well Water is the Cause of Much Typhoid Fever.

Dundas, April 16.—A special meeting of the Town Council was held last evening at which Mayor LAWSON, Reeve LAWSON, Deputy Reeve SPITAL and Councillors Boyle, Pennington, Lunn, Moss and Mount were present.

R. T. Wilson wrote that before leaving on his European trip last year he had sent in his resignation as an arbitrator for the town in the water dispute, but it had not reached the Council. He was leaving for Vancouver next month, and as he would be absent some time he desired to be relieved of the position. The resignation was accepted.

John S. Fry reported that the Board of Health considered the keeping of pigs within the municipality to be a nuisance, and a request was made that the Council pass a by-law prohibiting the practice. The matter was laid over to obtain the solicitor's opinion in the case.

Dr. Bertram, medical health officer, reported that during the year the following number of contagious diseases had been reported: Scarlet fever, 7 cases, 1 typhoid, 20 cases, 1 fatal. Scarlet fever and diphtheria had been kept within reasonable control, but typhoid was on the increase.

This condition of affairs was anticipated and it was found that unless the town water supply became more general a serious outbreak of typhoid was to be feared. The majority of typhoid cases were directly traceable to well water, and not one case to the town supply. With a more general extension of the town mains, typhoid would be pretty well eradicated.

The Isolation Hospital has produced good results, but the present building leaves much to be desired, as only one class of cases can be admitted at a time. If the Council cannot see its way clear to extend the mains this coming year, the appointment of a sanitary inspector was recommended, one who had no other official duties to perform. This would enable one man to do the fumigating and attend daily on the families in quarantine, also to make a house to house visitation and see that wells are properly cleaned out. The report was referred to the Finance Committee to report upon.

With regard to a statement by the Council on the evening of the 13th inst. that there had been gross carelessness on the part of some citizens in exposing beds, etc., which had been used by sufferers from contagious diseases, the board had found no evidence to support such a case. This report was also referred to the Finance Committee.

Mrs. Fenix asked for trees in front of her property on King street, between Market and Matilda streets, trimmed, as they now cause dampness in the houses. Referred to Board of Works.

Another resolution from the Board of Health was in relation to the liability of the board or the town for anti-toxine and necessary provisions ordered by the medical health officer. Referred to the town solicitor for his opinion.

Town Solicitor Owen wrote that the small strip of land between the Lucas block and the Carnegie library site had been legally deeded to the town.

Alex. Gerrie and J. W. Newitt applied for town water, and the Fire and Water Committee were given power to act in the matter.

A by-law was passed empowering the Council to borrow \$20,000 under an act of the Provincial Government, to pay off the town's floating debt. It provides that the debentures shall bear interest at four and a half per cent. The debentures run twenty years.

The Council adjourned after the by-law had been put through its several stages. The annual meeting of the officers and teachers of the Methodist Church was held on Wednesday evening. Rev. Mr. Harvey, the pastor presided. The reports submitted showed that in all respects the past year had been a very flourishing one. The treasurer's report showed a good sized surplus for the year.

The membership has reached 400. The election of officers resulted as follows: Superintendent, W. A. Davidson (24th consecutive time); Assistant Superintendents, W. H. Moss and J. A. Thompson; Secretary, E. A. L. Clarke; Assistant Secretary, H. S. Moss; Treasurer, James Ham; Librarian, George J. Pilegrim and F. A. Davidson; Director, R. W. Marsh; Missionary Treasurer, Miss Sara Burrows; Superintendent Home Department, C. E. Dickson.

A lodge of the Daughters of England was organized in Dundas last night, to meet the first and third Thursday evening of each month in Laird's hall. The organization was done by Leonard E. Cross, of Toronto, assisted by the District Deputy, Mrs. Revell, of Hamilton. Charter members to the number of fifteen were initiated last night. The charter remains open for one month. SHOT IN STREET.

"We hid and watched her coming in the house with a painful and while she was filling up a can, Fetterer slipped up behind her with the axe and swung it down on her head. Then I took a butcher-knife from the table and stuck it in her back, deep, and it broke off. I threw away the handle and then I grabbed a bread knife.

"I guess the blood which was all over me and Fetterer made me mad. I was crazy, I guess. We got down on our knees. Fetterer had a paring knife and we cut and slashed away at the woman. We cut her all up everywhere. When no more blood squirted out, we stopped and washed our hands and faces in the kitchen. We waited until the lights were lit before leaving the house. Then we sneaked out the back way. I cooked up the story about George Patyk."

Elmira Business Man May Die of His Wounds.

Elmira, N. Y., April 16.—Joseph McCann, one of Elmira's best known business men, and one of the leading meat dealers of the city, was shot down on the street in the centre of the city here at 9 o'clock this morning while on his way to his store. Two bullets entered his body. He was taken to the hospital and is supposed to have been Raymond Gill, a young man who had been employed by Mr. McCann, and who had been dismissed because of alleged short-coming in his accounts. The assailant fled on a bicycle. An effort was made to pursue him, but this far without success. His bicycle has been found in the outskirts of the city.

GERMAN HOUSE SUSPENDS.

Luebeck, Germany, April 16.—A local sensation was caused here to-day by the suspension of the Sees of Moosene, who was elected to the Bishopric of Althaus. The meetings of both House of Bishops and of the Standing Committee of the House of Delegates were well attended.

STRIKE ON LAKES.

Buffalo, April 15.—The strike of the sailors on the great lakes, or rather their refusal to work, is now in effect. Fully 15,000 men, from engineers to deck-hands, are affected by the decision of the union organizations not to operate boats belonging to members of the Lake Carriers' Association until its avowed purpose to enforce an open shop on the lake boats is abandoned.

AT HANDS OF SNIDER

Toronto, April 16.—That James Dillon came to his death on Tuesday night in a drunken brawl at 113 Jarvis street at the hands of one Harry Snider, was the verdict of the coroner's jury who investigated the occurrence at the morgue last evening. The juryman added a rider that "in our opinion the man Howard Evans had nothing to do with the striking or injuring of the deceased."

CONFESSES MURDER.

Some boats which have signed up men without the open shop clause and others with non-union crews will try to get out of port to-morrow. Several boats of the Mutual and Union lines have steam up ready to start, and an effort will be made to break through the ice. Union pickets are active on the docks, but no serious clash has occurred.

15-Year-Old Boy Murdered Mrs. Tony Pierog at the Falls.

Lockport, N. Y., April 15.—Romaine San Kowski, 15 years old, confessed before the grand jury to-day that he had killed Mrs. Tony Pierog at her home in Buffalo avenue at Niagara Falls on March 21.

HIS FAMILY INSANE.

Shelburne, April 15.—As the result of information laid by James Johnston, a well-known and wealthy farmer, of Mulmur Township, near Lavender, five members of his family are now lying in the jail here, charged with threatening to injure the person and property of the informant. They are: Mrs. Tod Jane Johnston, his wife; Mary Jane Johnston, daughter; David Johnston, Albert Edward Johnston and James Johnston, sons. Three constables encountered many difficulties in arresting them, and it was only after a struggle that Tod Jane Johnston, the wife, was handcuffed. Three men were necessary to hold her down while being handcuffed, and it was evident that she was quite insane.

A Mulmur Farmer Has Wife and Four Children Arrested.

On the arrival of the constables at the farm they found the two women in a nude state, and it was with considerable difficulty that they found enough in the house to dress them before bringing them to town.

EVILS OF PROTECTION.

Set Forth in Mr. Joseph Martin's English Election Address.

London, April 15.—Mr. Joseph Martin, K. C., has issued an election address, in which he says he considers the question of the House of Lords the most important with which the Liberal party has to deal. The adoption of tariff reform as advocated by the Tory party would be the greatest calamity that could happen the country, with the exception of war, pestilence or famine. The policy of protection would at once detract the United Kingdom from its proud position as the commercial mistress of the seas, and would also bring with it a long list of evils, including extreme electoral corruption, such as now prevailed in the United States and Canada.

Two Bishops Elected.

Winnipeg, Man., April 15.—Rev. John George Anderson, for the past 16 years incumbent of the Parish of St. Peter's, was this morning elected Bishop of Moosenee.

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
