President Tafi Interested in Stopping Infamous Traffic.

Bill to be Introduced Into Congress Dealing With It.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 25 .- Foregoing a contemplated horseback ride because of a snowstorm, President Taft devoted the entire afternoon to-day to a series of important conferences covering the subject of proposed amendments to the interstate commerce laws, legislation looking to the suppression of the white slave traffic.

It was with Attorney Sims and Mr. Mann that the president also took up the white slave question. Mr. Mann is to introduce a bill on this subject at the coming session of Congress. He believes the Government can prevent this triffac through the exercise of its power to control interstate and foreign commerce. The bill which Mr. Mann has drafted, and in which the president to-day exand in which the president to-day ex-pressed his deep interest, provides a heavy penalty for the enticement of a

pressed his deep interest, provides a heavy penalty for the enticement of a woman or girl from one place to another for immoral purposes, thereby causing her to go as a passenger over any fransportation line engaged in interstate or foreign commerce.

"The investigations in Chicago under the direction of District Attorney Sims and elsewhere," said Mr. Mann to-day at the close of the conference, "have disclosed a situation startling in its natures as to the extent of the traffic in young girls, both within the United States and from France and other foreign countries. Most of these American girls are enticed away from their homes in the country to large cities. The police power exercised by the State and municipal governments is inadequate to prevent this—particularly when the girls are enticed from one State to another, or from a foreign country to the United States."
