the Laurier-Fielding tariff policy?Do you believe that Laurier and  
Fielding in their tariff policy were  
working in the best interest of  
Canada?If you do you ought to vote against  
the King Government.

The King Government is not following the Laurier-Fielding tariff policy. It turned from that policy in 1924. Mr. Fielding's last budget speech was made May 11th, 1923. In that speech he announced the Government policy of tariff stability. "The tariff," he said, "will be a moderate tariff and probably as low as the country can afford to have under present conditions." I think the country should be content to accept the tariff as it will now stand as one as fair and reasonable as can be prepared under all the circumstances and business men should be able to carry on their business enterprises without fear of being soon disturbed by further changes.

In a year the Government changed its policy. Mr. Fielding became ill, his influence was gone. Mr. Robb's budget of 1924 put an end to any idea of tariff stability. It sounded the death knell of protection, and

Hon. Mr. Stewart. It is only the beginning, said Hon. Mr. Motherwell. Mr. King's speeches in this campaign bear them out. The Liberal-Progressive alliance in Ontario is another evidence. Official Liberalism in Simcoe is supporting Mr. Drury, the free trader who would buy our steel rails in Germany. In about forty constituencies Liberals have candidates and are supporting the Progressives. There is no doubt what they will do with protection.

Because of the King Government's departure from the Laurier fiscal policy Sir Lomer Gouin resigned his Cabinet position, Hon. Walter Mitchell gave up his seat, Mr. German (of Welland) wrote Premier King eight months ago stating his position and is not a candidate in this election. Mr. McCrae of Sherbrooke and Mr. Euler of North Waterloo are running as protectionist Liberals. Dr. Laurier, a relative of Sir Wilfrid, is an independent protectionist candidate, running against the King Government.

There are other notable facts. If you are a Liberal and want to be consistent with yourself and party traditions as interpreted by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, you cannot support the King Government.

**THE ISSUE**

With the Maritime Provinces and Quebec turning against him and no prospect of adding to his small following from Ontario, Premier King cannot hope to be the leader of a clear majority in the next Parliament. The best he can hope for is that the Conservatives will not have a clear majority and that he may continue to hold office with the support of the Progressives. What would follow would be four more years of log-rolling and of compromise, four more years of tinkering with the tariff.

If, on the other hand, the Conservatives are given a clear majority, as now seems almost a certainty, there is no doubt as to the policy of the party. The Conservatives stand foursquare for the principle of protection.

The people of Canada will have to decide whether they want four more years of Government which since 1922 has been principally engaged in side-stepping issues, or a Government which preaches the same policy from coast to coast and which has a definite program to place before the people.

**Deer Apparently More**  
**Plentiful**

The number of deer in New Bruns-  
wick seems to be greater this year  
than in recent years but some people  
condemn the increase in numbers as  
more apparent than real.

They argue that the animals change  
their ground frequently because of  
the scarcity of food and, on that  
account, appear in districts which  
have been free of bears for some  
time.

Degradations committed on sheep  
and other livestock in such districts  
give the residents the impression  
that bears have become numerous  
when they merely have shifted their  
activities from one section to an-  
other.

At present the price of bearskins  
is low and there is no great induc-  
ement to hunt or trap the animals.  
Other fur-bearing animals, whose  
pelts are much more valuable, can  
be taken with less inconvenience or  
danger. Hunters generally say the  
latter is not great as bears avoid  
human beings if possible.

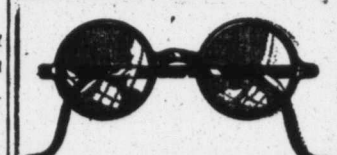
