The Grand Trunk Pacific.

The third reading of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway bill took place in the House of Commons, Ottawa at 5.30 o'clock Friday morning last May 27th, after an all night session. The Government's majority was 46 the vote standing 105 to 59 in favor of the deal.
