Mr. Rockefeller has completed the tack he set for himself in founding the University of Chicago. Public announcement was made of a "single and final gift" of \$20,000,000 which includes al contributions that Rockefaller had planned to make to the University. This sum will make a total of \$35,000, 000 that Mr. Rockefel er has donated to the University.

The icebound rains are still being searched for the body of Charles Edleman, who is known to be dead, and to discover, if possible, the bodies of several other firemen who are eported missing.

Recent intelligence from St. John's Mfld., says: Newfoundland is in the grip of a hurrican declared to be the worst known on the Island for many years. The storm has been raging forty-eight hours, and shows no sign of essation. Already much damage to fishing and other property along the coast has been reported. Trains are running far behind the schedule time, and the effects of the storm are felt on the storm blows itself out.


