Hon. Edward Blake's Speech at Picton. A crowd of 5000 person filled the large

akating rink at Picton, Ont., last week to listen to the Liberal leaders, who re caived a genuine oration.

It was 3.40 o'clock when C. H. Widdifield, secretary of the Prince Edward Reform Association, arcse and read an address of welcome to the Hon. Edward Blake. The vast audience, at the conclusion, arose en masse and for several minutes tendered the great Liberal leader an oyation such as he had not received preciation he could not fully express. He looked the picture of vigorous health. He began by a few complimentary references to the decorations, and then expressed his pleasure at the demonstration, the magnitude of which was not confined to the audience before him, for thousands failing to secure admission, were attending an overflow meeting in another part of the town. 
