Sand Bags Convinced.

The sand bag is invaluable in the sickroom. Get some clean, fine sand, dry it thoroughly in a kettle on the stove. Make a bag about eight inches square of flannel, fill it with dry sand, sew the opening carefully together and gover the bag with cotton or lines. This will prevent the sand from sifting out, and will enable you to heat the bag Please call and Examine Goods quickly by placing in the oven or even on top of the stove. After once using this you will never again attempt to warm the feet or hands of a sick person with a bottle of hot water or a brick. The sand holds the heat a long time, and the bag can be tucked up to the back without hurting the invalid. It is a good plan to make two or three of the bags and keep them on hand, ready



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
