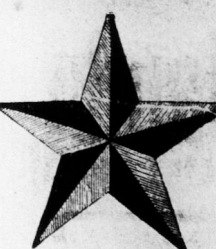

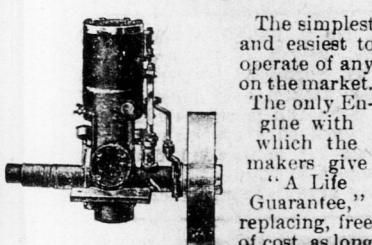

The Mediter-ranean Question.

LONDON, To-day.
In the course of his speech on the Supplementary Naval Estimates Churchill declared it would be necessary to make large additions to the personnel during the next four years and he foreshadowed an increase rate of pay. The Admiralty abandon the idea of maintaining any local superiority of the British Navy in the Mediterranean over the navies of Italy and Austria. The six older battleships will be withdrawn from that sea and replaced by four battle cruisers of the invincible type. The armoured cruiser squadron would be replaced by more powerful armoured cruisers and a torpedo station would be established at Alexandria. It will be necessary to provide two extra destroyer flotillas one this year and the other next year.

STUMPED FOR RECIPROCITY
Now Resigns Charge.

Ottawa, July 20.—Rev. Jos. Thackeray has been appointed pastor of the first congregational church here in succession to Rev. C. Watt Smith who resigned through differences with the congregation over his taking the stump in favor of the reciprocity pact last election.

Household Notes.

A pinch of salt added to cream will make it whip more easily.

Clean greasy skillets while they are hot, and use a little soda in the water.

To scald tomatoes easily, place them in a thin bag and dip in boiling water. Turpentine mixed with black lead and brushed over a greasy stove is very effective in cleaning it.

To save grease when frying doughnuts, put half a teaspoonful of ginger in the grease when hot.

Chopped preserved ginger added to the sauce served with cottage pudding is a delicious accompaniment.

To keep salt meat from molding, rub every fortnight with white of egg in which has been mixed a little salt.

To give a very delicate scent, place a large piece of orris root in the water in which lingerie is washed.

To wash fine lace, soak it in suds in the sun for two or three days. Change the water and rub gently every day.

To render children's clothing fire-proof, dissolve a level tablespoonful of sal ammoniac in the last rinsing water.

A palette knife is a great help in the kitchen for cleaning cake dough from the mixing bowl, and for many other uses.

To clean and tighten cane seats, soak them well in hot water, and use soap if it is needed. Then dry in the open air.

If the cellar is dark, it is a good plan to have the bottom step painted white, so that it can be seen in the dim light.

To get the best results from dried fruits, put to soak in warm water to which a generous pinch of salt has been added.

A tasty dessert is made of squash or pumpkin, prepared as for pie. It is baked in a pudding dish, like a baked custard.

A little molasses put on the roasting place of sparrows when they become a nuisance over the windows will drive them to other quarters.

A rag sponge can be bought at any paint shop, and is the best thing that can be used for keeping the bathtub and lavatory clean and dry.

To remove iron rust, wet the spots with salt and lemon juice, hold the material over the steam of the tea-kettle, and then put out in the sun.

Individual tarts are much served nowadays with fruit or pumpkin filling and with ice cream or whipped cream on top; with them serve coffee.

Never boil a silk handkerchief or rub soap on it. Wash in suds made of fine white soap, squeeze out, half dry in the sun and iron while damp.
