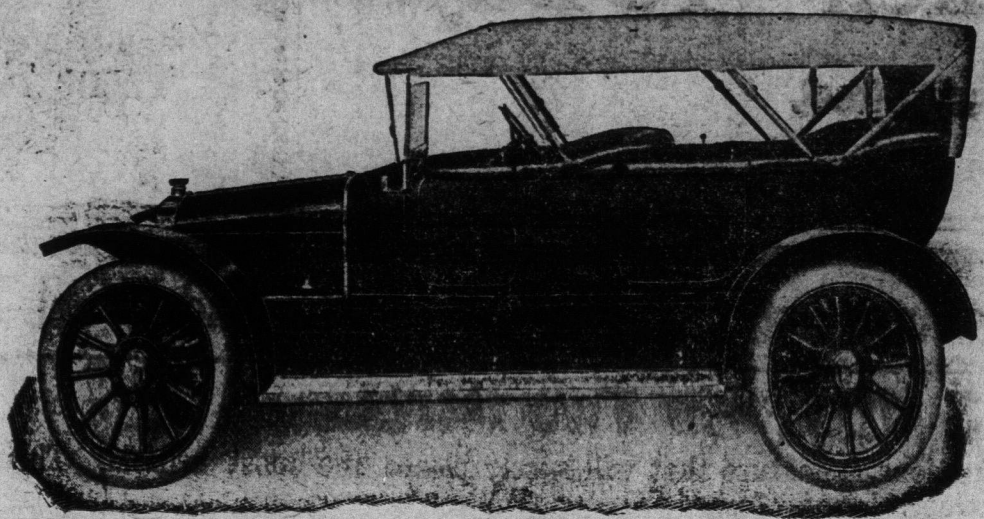

OLIVER CROMWELL died 1658, aged 59. He was as great a statesman as he was a general, and although his constructive policy at home left no permanent trace on English History, which has developed on far other lines than he approved, yet his destructive work in safeguarding English liberties, both civil and religious, has been permanent. Under his rule England was prosperous at home and successful abroad. He was one of the greatest of Englishmen, long execrated as a regicide, now revered as a hero, saint and demigod, guilty of many mistakes, but animated by the highest ideals of religion and liberty.
