"I'm not ill at all," called my neighbor from above stairs, "and above stairs, and I'm just shaking my cold."

Above stairs she motioned me to a seat near the window. "Don't come near me, sit down there where you won't get the germs, and I'll explain myself. Perhaps you remember the first of last winter I had a horrid cold. Well I wouldn't give in to it and I struggled for a month, feeling worse and worse, and finally landed in bed with a mastoid abscess, after three people I know of and I don't know how many more I don't know of, had caught that cold."

Rest and Gargle, Then Rest Some More.

"Well that's the last time for that sort of thing for me. My doctor says the only way to get rid of a cold is to give in to it, that is rest and get yourself in condition to throw it off. Cod were found plentiful on the local grounds this morning and of a very large size. There was a great deal of salmon out from the middle cove, Logy Bay and Outer Cove this morning. The price has declined somewhat as the fish were wholesaled for 10 cents a pound. Those who profess to know say that the fact that local fishing grounds were teeming with salmon at the outbreak of the season is an excellent omen that the codfish will be numerous here while the trapping season is on.

RE-ENLISTED AT 54.

Corporal James O'Brien, of the Army Service Corps, aged fifty-four, an old soldier who re-enlisted last December was charged at North London on Saturday with having been drunk and disorderly. He had been wounded in the shoulder at St. Julien.

4,000 ITALIANS TO FIGHT.

A large Italian demonstration took place in London yesterday afternoon, when between seven and eight thousand Italians marched in procession to the Italian Embassy. 20 Grosvenor Square, W. The Ambassador did not appear.

At the three o'clock mass at St. Peter's church, Saffron Hill, Clerkenwell, Father Cristofaro announced the mobilization. He anticipates that 4,000 Italians in London are affected.

INSOLENT ATTACK ON UNITED STATES BY GERMAN EXPEDITION.

London, June 4.—The Times, this morning: "German press comment on the reply to the Lusitania note followed the obvious line. The main points being that it is a mere preliminary to a further exchange of views, and that Germany, of course, will not abandon her submarine warfare upon commercial shipping."

"Nevertheless, the Berliner Tageblatt allows its naval correspondent, Capt. Persius, to make one of the most insolent attacks on the United States that has yet been published. In an attack which may be intended by the German naval authorities to keep German diplomacy up to the mark, he writes:

"One must not be under any illusions. The North American wants to do business. This desire is universal. He desires that the war shall last a long time yet. It is not only this. A considerable percentage of the North American people is following with enormous excitement the naval rise in the shares of the munition factories, and the longing to make profits in this way has put the masses into a wild state of excitement."

"No doubt certain people, and friends of peace, turn away in horror but their influence is small. The American is enjoying the part played by Tertius Gaudens and will not abandon it. Cries of indignation about the murder of North American women and children are proof of morality and are also cheap; it would be a mistake to regard them as more than by-play, which will speedily come to nothing."
