The Diphtheria Outbreak.

At last night's meeting of the Civic Commission a lengthy report from Dr. Brehm, the Medical Health Officer. on the cause of the recent diphtheria outbreak was read. In the opinion of the Health Officer the outbreak was mainly due to the number of cases that were not reported. Most of the cases were mild, and many persons thought them to be merely sore throats or slight tonsilitis not requiring the services of a doctor. Many of these sore throats, he said, are diphtheric in nature and are the chief means by which the disease is spread

An inspection of the milk supply proved that the milk was not the cause of the outbreak. Bad sanitary nditions such as defective drainage are not a direct cause of diphtheria but they probably act to some extendas predisposing causes by undermining the general health and lessening the power of resistance. He further added that flies may be the means of past week there has been no new case


