Jellicoe and Nelson.

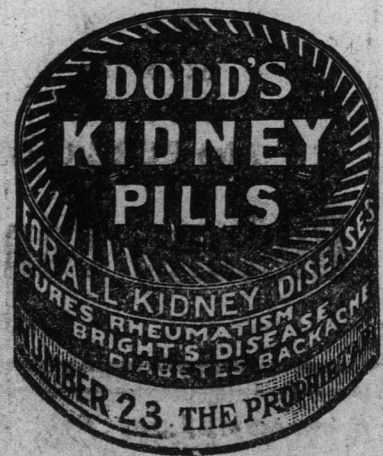

Admiral Jellicoe's vigil in the North Sea has not yet reached the length of Nelson's before Toulon, 1805-06. When he had been fourteen months off the port Nelson received a vote of thanks from the City of London for his skill and perseverance in preventing the enemy from putting to sea. "I beg to inform your lordship," he replied to the Lord Mayor, "that the port of Toulon has never been blockaded by me—quite the reverse. Every opportunity has been offered the enemy to put to sea, for it is there we hope to realize the hopes and expectations of our country."

A few years earlier, after the battle of the Nile, Nelson returned to England through Germany. It makes pleasant reading that, as Southey tells us, an aged wine merchant pressed on Nelson's acceptance six dozen of Rhenish wine of the vintage of 1625, which he had preserved for some extraordinary occasion. Part of this incomparable wine "would then have the honor to flow into the heart's blood of that immortal hero, and this thought would make him happy for the remainder of his life." Nelson accepted six bottles only. On the same occasion a German pastor, between 70 and 80 years of age, traveled forty miles with the Bible of his parish church to ask Nelson to write his name on the fly-leaf. He called him the saviour of the Christian world. It would be interesting to know how that signature has fared in these straining times.

Patients for Hospitals.

There arrived by the Portia from Hermitage a young woman named Maud Combes, who is suffering from a tubercular knee, for the General Hospital. John Lockyer of Bay de Verde has entered the institution to be treated for cancer in the hip. A young man named Churchill, aged 21, suffering from consumption, was admitted to St. George's Hospital, Signal Hill, this morning.

Japan Rushes Munitions to Russia.

Have Sent Twenty Train Loads a Day for More Than Three Months.

New York, Oct. 13.—Russia has been receiving munitions of war from Japan at an average rate of twenty train loads a day for more than three months, according to Cyprus Robinson, a London mining engineer, who arrived here to-day on the steamer California from Liverpool.

Mr. Robinson said he was in Petrograd for two months on government business. Rail communications via Vladivostok, he explained, had been turned over almost entirely to military trains. The war material from Japan, he explained, had helped in a great measure to check the advance of the Central Powers.

Frederick Donaldson, formerly governor of the Woolwich arsenal, arrived to inspect shipments of munitions. Some of the munitions already shipped, he said, had been defective.

CARING FOR GRAY HAIR.

The only time when gray hair is unattractive is when it is improperly cared for; when it is streaked with yellow, and to be brutally frank, when it isn't clean. Gray hair should have a regular fortnightly shampoo. For this warm water and a mild white soap should be used and the strands rubbed between the hands until every trace of oil has been cut loose by the lather. Following the soap washing there should be a rinsing with clear warm water. Let the temperature of the rinsing water be gradually increased until it is as hot as can be borne with comfort, and then gradually lower the temperature until it is cold.

Never shampoo the hair at night as the best time is in the morning when the drying can be done beside an open window where the strands will get the benefit of fresh air and sunshine. Do the drying with warmed Turkish towels, gently rubbing the strands until every trace of moisture has disappeared. Then, very gently, comb out any tangles; don't brush them out, as if you do you may break some of the strands.

After combing and brushing, separate the hair in parts all over the head and rub the scalp, very lightly, with pure olive oil. Use very little oil, just enough to moisten the finger tips. The next day dust the scalp with rice powder and, with a soft brush, rub the powder around until all trace of the oil has been absorbed. In between these semi-monthly shampoos there should be a dry shampoo. This begun by carefully combing and brushing the hair and then generously sprinkling rice powder thick on the scalp and through the strands.

Rub the powder in the scalp and through the strands until any oil has been absorbed and then cleanse the hair of the powder by another careful combing and brushing. This treatment, regularly used, will keep gray hair fresh looking, silvery and fluffy. And that means it will keep it attractive.

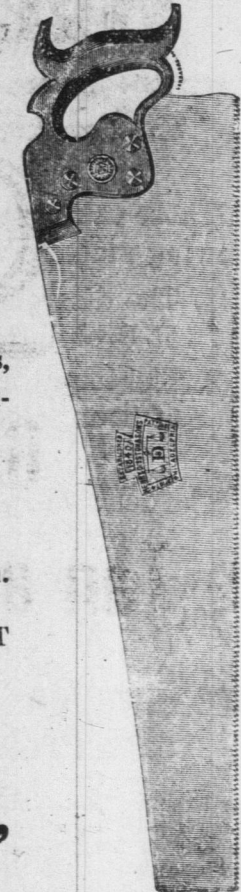

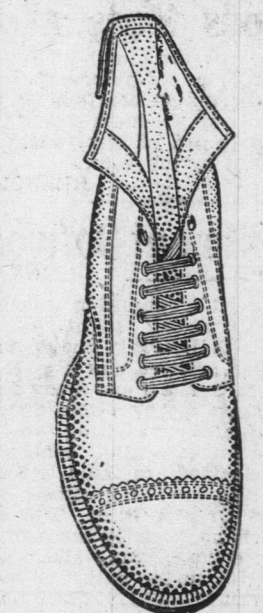
