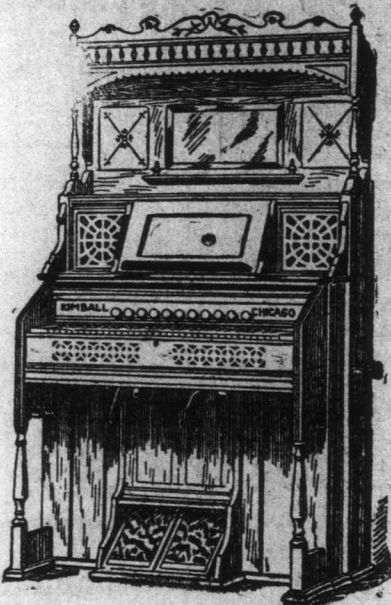

Railway Acci- dent Inquiry.

In the Central District Court yester-
day afternoon Judge Morris,
the preliminaries in connection with
the recent train tragedy at Mount
Moriah were held. Mr. P. J. Sum-
mers, K.C., Deputy Minister of Jus-
tice, and Mr. P. A. Mewa, B.L., re-
presented the Crown, and Mr. W. J. Hig-
gins, K.C., represented the Reid Mtd.
Co. In opening the proceedings Judge
Morris said: "The inquiry is preli-
minary to instructions communicated to
me by the Government through the
Department of Justice, to hold an in-
vestigation into the railway accident
which occurred on the 24th ultimo, in
which five passenger cars, attached to
the west-bound express, were de-
tailed near Curling resulting in the death
of one passenger and injury to a
number of others. My instructions
further state that the Government are
anxious that this inquiry should be as
far-reaching and thorough as possi-
ble, and that all available witnesses
should be brought before this Tri-
bunal. I am further instructed that
the Deputy Minister of Justice, Mr.
Summers, K.C., with him Mr. F. A.
Mewa, B.L., are to undertake the con-
duct of this investigation on behalf
of the Government." Mr. Summers,
K.C., pointed out that the object of
the inquiry is to ascertain the cause
of the accident and as some material
witnesses have to be obtained, he as-
ked for a postponement. The opening
of the enquiry was therefore set for
3.30 p.m. Monday.

Runaway Horse.

Last evening, about 7 o'clock, while
driving up Quidi Vidi Road, in charge
of Sergeant John Dunn, a horse owned
by William Dunn, bolted, throwing the
driver from his seat to the ground,
severely injuring his neck and shoulder
and cutting his face, who, notwith-
standing his hurts, pluckily held on
to the reins and was dragged a con-
siderable distance by the frightened
animal, when his leg, becoming en-
tangled with the wheels of the car-
riage, he was obliged to release his
hold on the lines. The horse with the
carriage, containing his dead mate, un-
til at the end of the road he collided
with a telegraph pole. The impact
broke the animal's back and later it
was chloroformed by Dr. Fureaux.
The carriage was considerably dam-
aged but not beyond repair. Sergeant
Dunn is pretty well shaken up but so
far as is known, no bones were
broken, though he had a very narrow
escape from death, and it was a mir-
acle that his neck was not broken.
The loss of the horse, which was about
seven years old, is a serious one to
Mr. Dunn, he valuing the beast at
\$300.

Fiona Resold.

It is rumoured that the purchasers
of the S.S. Fiona have sold the ship
for \$13,500. If the sale as above noted
has been effected the late buyers have
realized an enormous profit, and the
Government have suffered an equi-
valently enormous loss. There is
