

Funeral Obsequies of Mother Mary Ignatius

Yesterday morning at the Oratory of the Immaculate Conception, Solemn Mass of Requiem for the repose of the soul of Mother Mary Ignatius Carrick was celebrated by Rt. Rev. Mgr. McDermott, Rev. P. P. Sheehan, St. Patrick's being Deacon and Rev. M. Leamy, Sub-Deacon. His Grace the Archbishop was assisted at the Throne by Rev. J. J. Pippy, P.P., Fouch Cove; Rev. Dr. Greene, Rev. Dr. Carter and Rev. E. Wilson were the chanters. The absolution at the catafalque was given by the Archbishop and immediately afterwards the funeral procession wended its way to the Convent Cemetery, where was laid to rest the body of one whose life was devoted to others, who possessed the soul of an angel and the heart of a child. At the graveside the last blessing was given by Rt. Rev. Mgr. McDermott, Rev. Fr. McCarthy, P.P., Renew, Rev. Fr. Caciola, P.P., Bar Haven, Rev. R. St. John and several of the Christian Brothers and Sisters of Mercy visited the Convent to pay their tribute of respect to the memory of the dead departed Nun. R.I.P.


Encourage Home Industries.

To Sister Unions:
At the regular meeting of the Newfoundland Industrial Workers' Association held in their rooms, corner of Springdale and Water Street, on Friday night, Nov. 12th, the question of closing down of the Shoe Factories came up for consideration, and as we feel that all Union Men are brothers, the Association moved to have itself placed on record as being in sympathy with those who are out of employment, through the action of said factories, and further, that a set of Resolutions be prepared by the Executive, calling on all Union Men to patronize and buy local made shoes, so as to terminate this lay off as speedily as possible. The Resolutions follow:
That Whereas the Shoe Factories are closed for an indefinite period in this city, causing a lot of Union men to be out of employment;
And Whereas living expenses are enormously high, and a man wants every hour to be able to support his family;
And Whereas it is a fact if Union men and their families would buy local made shoes instead of the imported article, this stopping of work would not have happened.
Be it Resolved that the Union men of St. John's, with their families pledge themselves to buy nothing but local made shoes, provided they are as cheap as the imported article, so as to relieve the congestion as speedily as possible.
